

LIBERTY BONDS WORTH QUARTER MILLION VANISH

Securities Disappear From Mail in Transit.

CHICAGO, Jan. 10.—The disappearance of \$250,000 in Liberty bonds consigned by the First National Bank of Detroit, Mich., to the Studebaker Corporation at South Bend, Ind., remained a mystery today, though the loss was noted January 4.

The bonds, twenty-five in number, of \$10,000 each, bear numbers 23,734 to 23,758.

Postoffice records at South Bend are said to show that five registered packages were delivered to the Studebaker offices on January 4. Studebaker employees found four of the packages, but the fifth, which contained the bonds, was missing.

The postmaster is said to have exhibited a receipt for this package, bearing the signature of the 17-year-old mail clerk employed by the corporation. The lad denied that the signature was his and insisted that he had received no such package.

A. R. Reskine, president of the Studebaker corporation, informed the federal reserve bank here today that the bonds disappeared in transit between Detroit and South Bend. He denied that they were received by the corporation. The bonds are of the fourth loan.

28 Murders And Suicides Here in 1918

Revolver Favorite Means of Destruction, City Records Disclose.

Murderers and suicides in Oklahoma City prefer the revolver above any other means of destruction, it was shown this morning when the annual death report of the health department was made public. The report showed that fourteen murders were committed in the city in 1918 and fourteen suicides. The same number was reported in 1917.

Of the fourteen murders during the year, thirteen were committed with the revolver. The other victim died of knife wounds. Eight of the fourteen suicides used revolvers, two drank lysoal, and carbolic acid, hanging, drugs and a razor claimed one victim each.

There were only thirty-five fatalities as a result of accidents last year, as against forty-seven in 1917. Automobiles were the cause of most of these.

Mayer and McKee were the prosecuting witnesses in the case he asserts.
