PARIS, May 6.—The supreme economic council has decided on certain relaxations of the financial restrictions on trade with Germany pending the signing of the peace treaty. The financial blacklist will be suspended and neutral countries have been notified that they are free to extend credits of any kind to Germany or German citizens.

### Treaty to German Envoys Tomorrow

(By The Associated Press.)  
PARIS, May 6.—It was officially announced last night that the preliminaries of the peace treaty will be communicated to the allied delegates this afternoon and to German plenipotentiaries Wednesday afternoon. This announcement agrees with unofficial reports of the intentions of the peace conference.

It developed this afternoon that changes were still being made in the peace treaty and that the changing process probably would be continued up to the last possible moment. It is understood that the alterations are largely those of phraseology.

### Treaty May Be Signed by June 1

PARIS, Monday, May 5.—It seems now to be quite possible that the peace treaty with Germany will be disposed of before June 1, a member of the American delegation said tonight.

President Wilson, in addition to attending the meeting of the council of three in the morning and going to Versailles to look over the arrangements for the meeting with the Germans there on Wednesday, visited the Hotel de Crillon in the afternoon and held conferences with the entire American delegation. He also saw Herbert C. Hoover, Admiral Benson and other experts, and disposed of many minor problems, the solution of which had been delayed.

President Wilson was prompted to go to Versailles, it appears, chiefly because during the conference of the council of three in the morning Premier Lloyd George and Clemenceau held that the newspaper men could not be admitted to the session with the Germans on Wednesday because of the lack of space. President Wilson was not convinced that this was the case, and he insisted upon going to Versailles with the two premiers. It was after their visit that the announcement was made that the American and British journalists had won their fight for representation and that a total of forty-five journalists from the various nations would be permitted to attend the ceremony.

### French Minister Heads League Body

PARIS, Monday, May 5.—Stephen Pichon, the minister of foreign affairs of France, was elected chairman of the provisional organization of the League of Nations, according to an official statement issued after the meeting, which was held at the American headquarters. He was elected on a motion of Colonel E. M. House. Sir Eric Drummond of Great Britain, assumed his duties as acting secretary-general.

### Austrian Envoys Summoned May 12

GENEVA, May 6.—Delegates of German-Austria who have been summoned to appear in Paris May 12 to receive the text of the treaty between the allied powers and Austria, are beginning to arrive at Berne and Geneva. The delegation, which will number thirty-two persons will be headed by Dr. Franz Klein.

PARIS, May 6.—(Havas.)—Marshal Petain, commander of the French army, was present at a conference Monday between President Wilson and Premier Clemenceau. Afterward Premier Clemenceau conferred with several members of the French cabinet concerning details of the preliminary peace.

### Judging From This, Big Four Spent Most of Their Time Just Thinking Up Clauses to Write in Final Pact

(By Universal Service.)  
LONDON, May 6.—The peace treaty with Germany contains more than one thousand clauses, writes the Paris correspondent of the Daily Chronicle. The number of clauses in some of the big former pacts were:  
Treaty of Paris, 1815, 38 clauses.  
Treaty closing Crimean war, 35 clauses.  
Preliminaries in 1871, 10 clauses.  
San Stefano, 1878, 29 clauses.  
The most important of the 1,000 clauses in the present treaty may be grouped under six heads, thus:  
1—Military, naval, aerial.  
2—Territorial.  
3—Financial and economic.  
4—Responsibilities for war crimes and penalties.  
5—League of nations covenant.  
6—International labor problems.  
"Many surprises of detail are in store for the public," the correspondent avers, and there will be hundreds of points that will be "Greek" to laymen.

### Chinese to Sign With Reservations

PARIS, Monday, May 5.—The Chinese delegation to the peace conference is displaying great dissatisfaction with the announced settlement of the Shantung problem. While the Chinese probably will not refuse to sign the peace treaty, it appears likely they will sign it with reservations.

### EIGHT DIE IN COLUMBUS FIRE; MANY INJURED

Several Are Believed to Be Fatally Hurt.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 6.—Eight persons are known to have perished and a dozen were injured, several probably fatally, in a fire which early strove a six-story apartment house in the downtown section shortly after midnight this morning. Miraculous escapes, some by jumps from the fifth and sixth stories, into life nets and the tossing of infants several stories into nets and an army of fire-fighters made it the most spectacular fire this city has known in some time.

At 4 o'clock this morning the police found the bodies of a man and a woman on the fourth floor. Their names have not been ascertained.

They were suffocated and burned in bed.  
Four small children of Mrs. Steigelwald are believed to have perished on the sixth floor from which their mother leaped to her death. They are unaccounted for. Numerous others have not been found by friends or the police and officers early this morning expressed fear that half a dozen were trapped and burned to death.

Miss Anna Bell Joyce, 38, cannot live, physicians say. She was taken from the building in a semi-conscious condition after the blaze was under control. That she was alive is attributed to her hanging across an

Russian propagandists have been expelled from the country, the bolshevik bureau of information in Copenhagen dissolved, and the circulation of Russian money forbidden.
