## REVOLUTION.

Spain Seems To Be On the Eve of Disruption.

## NO NEWS YET FROM DEWEY

### SPIES AT WORK. ANXIETY

Increases in Washington on Account of Lack of News from Dewey.

### IS IT HERE? Persistent Reports That Dewey's Report Has Been Received But Is Withheld From The Public.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Official Washington is still in a state of suspended animation as it were. Congress and citizens generally are anxiously awaiting the report from Commodore Dewey giving the full facts as to the famous sabbath day battle at Manila and its results. All day yesterday reports circulated that the dispatch from Dewey had been received. They came from such apparently reliable sources that they were generally accepted as correct. Today this belief is freely expressed among army and navy officers and government officials, and many people have come to the conclusion that the report is being withheld from the public for good and sufficient reasons.

### TO OCCUPY MANILA. A Force of 2,000 Volunteers Will be Sent, Together With Big Guns and Ammunition.

A Battle is Considered Imminent Between Sampson's Fleet and the Enemy.

### DEWEY'S REPORT Will Be Given to the Public in Substance as Soon as Received.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The failure of the navy department to receive official advices from Dewey is not surprising to Secretary Long. He says Dewey would hardly have detached one of his vessels to carry dispatches to Hong Kong, the nearest cable station, until he had completed the work he had out to him to do. He certainly didn't send a dispatch boat until he had hoisted the stars and stripes over the fortification of Manila.

### THE REDUCTION OF HAVANA CANNOT BE UNDERTAKEN TOO SOON, FOR CUBA IS STARVING.

Reports of German and Austrian Intervention Send American Securities Up.

MADRID, May 5.—The situation throughout Spain this morning continues most threatening. Reports of terrible riots and uprisings of the people are pouring in from all the provinces. The authorities seem powerless. In most cases there has been bloodshed and great destruction of property.

A serious disturbance occurred at Caceres last night. A still more violent outbreak has taken place in Leon. At that place large crowds of women and children, totally uncontrollable in their frenzy, paraded the streets crying "Give us bread or work."

A mob of ten thousand infuriated people plundered the principal streets and houses in Holquist; a dozen people were killed.

The stoppage of all commercial activities by the war has caused a most pitiable and awful condition of things all over Spain, and the fire of revolution seems to be breaking out at every point. Nearly all of Spain is under martial law.

### BLANCO'S PLANS DISCLOSED.

Rich Spaniards Desert Cuba.

KEY WEST, May 5.—The Spanish mail found on steamship Argonauta was sent to Washington. The mail included letters containing information of a startling character. These letters clearly indicate the intention of Gen. Blanco to evacuate the eastern end of Cuba and most of the southern coast districts in order to concentrate all his military forces in Havana, Matanzas, Mariel, and other northern cities.

Private letters found in the mail disclose a most shocking condition of affairs in Havana and Matanzas. The poor people are dying of starvation by the hundreds. The government is simply a military despotism. All the theatres are closed. Many rich and influential citizens are paying enormous sums to charter small fishing smacks, sloops, or any other kind of craft to carry them to Jamaica, Mexico, Hayti, and Port Thomas. This desertion of the island by the rich in this hour of distress angers the lower classes and adds greatly to the danger of popular discontent.

### HAMPTON ROADS DEFENSELESS.

Submarine Mines Rendered Useless by Cutting the Cables.

NORFOLK, Va., May 5.—A man just from Willoughby Spit brings the startling information that the main cable connecting the submarine mines across Hampton roads was out in three places last night and the submarine defenses were thereby rendered practically useless.

A Spanish spy who recently escaped is charged with the deed.

### THE PHILIPPINES Are a Most Important Possession in Which China is Most Interested.

LONDON, May 5.—The Birmingham Post this morning quotes the declaration of the New York Sun that the Philippines, through Spain's choice of war, are the rightful property of the United States, and dwells at some length upon the great importance of the question of the disposition of these islands to the world at large.

The Manchester Guardian says: "A very competent authority lately stated that the Philippines are the richest islands in the world. The sum of money sent to Spain every year by the colonial officials is enormous, but it is largely exceeded by the amount that is sent to China by Chinese traders, who have absorbed the entire retail trade of the islands."

### FOREIGN WARSHIPS Hovering About Our Northeast Coast.

PHILADELPHIA, May 5.—Five war ships, evidently strangers in America's waters, went passed Sunday night fifty miles northeast of Georges shoals, of New Foundland, by the Allan line steamship Turanian, which just arrived here. The fleet consisted of a battle ship, a cruiser, and three smaller boats resembling torpedo craft.

### SUPPLIES LANDED. The Invasion of Cuba Beginning in Earnest.

KEY WEST, May 5.—The first lot of supplies to be shipped by the United States for the use of the Cuban insurgents was successfully landed and turned over to General Gomez. The supplies, in charge of Capt. J. Dorst, 4th cavalry, and a number of Cubans, left here by the government tug Leyden on Tuesday. The gunboat Wilmington conveyed the tug to a point on the Cuban coast near Mariel. There was a scrap with a body of Spanish cavalry at the landing place, but everything was safely landed.

### "GLORIFIES THE AMERICAN NAVY." Dewey's Achievement Will Be Great in History.

LONDON, May 4.—Vice Admiral Phillip Howard Colomb, U. S. N. retired, speaking of the great victory of the United States at Manila said "I doubt if there was ever before such an extraordinary illustration of the influence of sea power. The boldness displayed by Dewey places beyond question the assertion that henceforth he must be regarded as one of the world's great captains, whose dash and vigor glorify the American navy."

### SENT TO SAN FRANCISCO. Presumably for Dewey's Transport Ships.

NORFOLK, May 5.—A very important order was received at the navy yard today, directing the immediate shipment to San Francisco of a large number of big rapid firing guns now here. It is presumed that they will be mounted on the transports which will carry 2,000 volunteers to the Philippines. The guns are being shipped now.

### ORDERS TO SAMPSON. Commodore Wilson Bears Dispatches to Sea.

TAMPA, May 5.—Commodore Wilson left this morning on the Oliveette for Key West, bearing important information for Rear Admiral Sampson at sea.

### HURRIEDLY Special Messenger Leaves Tampa for Washington With Important Information.

TAMPA, May 5.—A special messenger hurriedly left Gen. Shafter's headquarters this morning and proceeded at once to Washington. It is known that he carries important information to Gen. Miles concerning the plans of Sampson's squadron.

### CADIZ SQUADRON Admiral Camara to Command.

MADRID, May 5.—Admiral Camara will take command of the Cadiz squadron tomorrow.

### BATTLE IMMINENT It is Thought, as the Naval Hospital Corps is Ordered to Sea.

NORFOLK, Va., May 5.—The hospital ship Solace, formerly the Creole, was ordered today to sail at once for Key West. She has a full complement of physicians and nurses, and large supplies of medicine aboard. As soon as she is coaled and provisioned she will leave here. It is thought that a battle is imminent, and that the Solace will be needed for service in connection with Rear Admiral Sampson's fleet.

### SPANISH SPY Arrested, Having in his Possession Plans of a U. S. Warship.

CAMDEN, N. J. May 5.—A Spanish spy was arrested this morning at Dialogue's ship yards by a United States secret service detective. He had in his possession complete plans of the gunboat Princeton.

### Free Zone. WASHINGTON, May 4.—The house met at noon today. After disposing of a few matters of minor importance it went into committee of the whole to discuss and report upon the resolution to repeal the act which prohibited importation in bond through the United States to the Mexico free zone.

### Major Generals. WASHINGTON, May 4.—The president sent to the senate today the following nominations: To be major generals: Brig. Gen. Joseph C. Breckinridge, inspector general U. S. A.; Brig. Gen. Wm. Shafter; Brig. Gen. Wm. Graham; Brig. Gen. James F. Wade; Brig. Gen. Henry C. Merriam; Brig. Gen. E. S. Otis; Brig. Gen. J. C. Coppinger; James H. Wilson of Delaware; Fitzhugh Lee of Virginia; Wm. J. Sewall of New Jersey; Joseph Wheeler of Alabama.

### In Congress Today. WASHINGTON, May 5.—It took the house from noon to nearly 1 o'clock to get down to important matters today. The conference report on the Alaska bill, to extend the operation of the United States homestead laws and right of way laws to that territory, was taken up and discussed.

### WASHINGTON, May 5.—Mr. Quay called up the postoffice appropriation bill in the senate today. Mr. Money gave notice that he would ask the senate on Thursday, May 26, to put aside its regular business in order to pay respect to the memory of the late Senator Walthal, of Mississippi.

### WASHINGTON, May 5.—A joint resolution was introduced in the house by Mr. Newlands of Nevada providing for the immediate annexation of the Hawaiian Islands. The resolution is being considered by the committee of foreign affairs today, and it is understood that it will be favorably reported next Tuesday.

### Another Fatal Fire in Chicago. CHICAGO, May 4.—The extensive glue works of the Armour Packing Co., in 31st street, were destroyed by fire this afternoon. Twelve to fifteen lives are reported lost. The bodies of five men had been recovered at 3 p. m. A number of people were badly injured by flying debris and by jumping.

### Yesterday in Congress. WASHINGTON, May 4.—Congress transacted little business today, although an animated debate occurred in the senate over war measures. An income tax was proposed. The senate finance committee is making slow progress on the war revenue bill.

### Santiago Quiet. KINGSTON, Jamaica, May 5.—British Consul Rameson Santiago cables that he is safe and that the city is now quiet, thanks to English gunboats.

### Soldiers Tought. Five coaches and a baggage car conveying a large number of the cavalry known as "Teddy's Terror," will arrive at the Santa Fe station tonight at 9:30, and will be transferred to the G. H. for transit last.

### A deed was recorded this morning from M. E. Pearce and Terry Pearce conveying a tract of land containing 48 acres and located in the San Elizario grant to A. M. Loomis and Millard Patterson.
