INDEPENDENCE DAY.


Next Monday will be the 122d anniversary of the birth of our nation—the United States. We have much to remember upon this occasion.

FOURTH DIVISION.

FIFTH DIVISION.

Marshals—O. W. McPhetridge and W. F. Payne. Horseback corps. City officials. County officials. Visitors. All other vehicles.

SIXTH DIVISION.

SEVENTH DIVISION.

RENDEZVOUS.

Participants will assemble under the control of their respective marshals as follows: First Division—200 feet north of Second street on Santa Fe street.

LINE OF MARCH.

East on Second to El Paso, thence north to San Antonio, thence east to Magoffin avenue, thence east to Virginia, thence north to Franklin, thence east to Oregon, thence south through little plaza to San Antonio street, thence east to Oregon, where procession will be dismissed to enable each to reach the plaza from more than one point.

ORDER OF DISMISSAL.

When each division reaches San Antonio and Oregon streets they will move as stated below, then return to plaza or disband under control of their respective marshals.

FLAG RAISING AND PATRIOTIC EXERCISES—11:00 A. M.

Immediately upon the disbanding of the parade, at the plaza, about 11 o'clock the following exercises will take place: The Stars and Stripes Forever (Souls)—McGinty band. March—Liberty Bell (Souls)—McGinty band.

Acceptance of the flag for the city, by Mayor Magoffin.

Raising of the flag by Quartermaster Sergeant J. L. Douglass, of the United States Army, accompanied by a salute of cannon.

Unfurling of the flag.

At a signal Sergeant Douglass will release the folds of the flag, and at that moment the chorus, with all the audience, will sing The Star Spangled Banner.

Address—C. W. Kendrick, United States consul at Juarez. Music—Yankee Doodle—McGinty band.

Reading of the Declaration of Independence, by the Hon. Leigh Clark. Music—Hail Columbia, sung by the chorus under Prof. Smith. Address in Spanish—Senor Esteban Gomez del Campo. Music—Selection—Chihuahua band. Address—Hon. W. M. Colwell. Music—America, sung by the chorus, and by all the audience. Benediction—Rev. M. Cabell Martin. Music—Dixie—Played by the combined bands.
