



GRIP IS CONTAGIOUS.

Now, Ragging In All of Our Eastern Cities.

The board of health of Greater New York has decided that grip is a contagious disease. The heads of the various bureaus in the department met a few days ago to discuss the prevalent disease, and they agreed unanimously that it could be communicated from one person to another.

The grip has been existent in that city for almost ten years, but this is the first time that it has been recognized as contagious. Hereafter all cases of the grip will be reported to the Health Board, and statistics concerning it will be made up by the officers.

The most prominent medical men of the city have become awakened to the dire emergency which faces the Health Department because of the vast number of grip cases which they have been called upon to treat within the last few days.

Mines and Mining.

A New Mining Enterprise.

The Mexico Mine and Smelter Supply company is the name of a new concern which will shortly commence business in the Mexican colony. Mr. H. R. Ayers, the president and general manager, Mr. F. L. Smith, the treasurer, and Mr. John Carey, the secretary of the company, went through El Paso a few days ago for the purpose of opening up the business.

Notes. Some valuable gold mines have been discovered in the Carmen mountains, in the state of Coahuila.

Near Aldama there has been discovered a vein of ore running 50 ounces of gold and 50 per cent of lead to the ton.

A new shaft is being sunk in La Mexicana mine, in the Arizpe district, to replace the one that recently caved in.

The Eddy brothers are shipping 30 tons of ore per day from the Nannie Baird mine in the Jarillas, and employ 60 men in and about the mine.

A report comes from the King of Arizona district that a rich strike has been made on the property of Pete McNichols, which is situated a short distance east of the King of Arizona claim.

Jose Elias who brought into Chihuahua five tons of rich ore from a newly discovered mine, near the Concho river, last week as announced in the Enterprise, has realized \$770 60 from his five tons of ore or \$154.12 per ton: of the amount about nine per cent, was realized from gold.

Charles Seawell, a mining man well known in El Paso and nearly all over Mexico and Central America, recently discovered and located a huge vein of ore on the line between the states of Chihuahua and Sonora.

Santa Rita, ninety miles north of Silver City, is known to the mining world for its copper mining. It is not uncommon to hear of mines being offered for a million dollars, and go begging at that.

J. H. McKim, of the big and rich Roy mine in Pilares district, Sonora, has concluded not to change the route of shipment of his ores via Bisbee to Denver until next spring.
