THE CITY WILL PAY EXPENSES

Of the Five Delegates To the Firemen's State Convention.

ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS

Allowed Last Night For That Purpose, Election Bills Were Acted Upon Favorably And the Council Meets Tomorrow Morning To Canvass Returns.

The city dads met last night with all present but Mr. Brunner. He came in later, however. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The council meets only once again until Messrs. Scott and Robinson retire and Messrs. Ogden and Whitmore succeed them.

The clerk presented a report from the city assessor for March which he read. It was referred to the taxation committee.

Alderman Robinson said that the street and grade committee had deferred action on purchasing the sprinklers and was granted further time.

Mr. Clifford, chairman of the finance committee, then presented the following bills, which were allowed:

The bill of Hull was OK'd by Mr. Clifford for he said he believed the write up in Hull's monthly well worth

the price of it. The write up was similar to those given the town by newspapers of this city every day, except that it attributed the prosperity of El Paso to Magoffin and the aldermen.

The clerk read a communication from the secretary of the fire department announcing the resignation of John Sullivan to accept a paid position. The appointment of other members was also announced and approved.

Campbell Real Estate Co. petitioned that the alley in block 283, Pierce Finley addition be run in another direction. Referred to the street and grade committee.

Mr. Clifford said that Zach White would put in his bill for electric lights next Thursday night.

W. D. Howe, attorney, came before the council to inquire what disposition had been made of the Pauly jail cell matter. He said Mr. Shelton had simply been authorized to offer the bid for the cells delivered here and not put up in the jail.

The contracts and correspondence between the city and company were produced and read by the clerk and then Attorney Howe proceeded to argue the matter.

Councilmen contended that Pauly had accepted the contract entered into by Shelton and City Attorney Kemp agreed to the contention.

The mayor asserted that Mr. Shelton had been given ample time to find out the cost of putting up the cells and he thought he ought to be bound by the contract.

LYNCHERS ON TRIAL.

Thirteen South Carolinians Face the Bar at Charleston For Killing a Negro Postmaster in a Barbarous and Cowardly Manner.—Story of the Crime.

A Charleston, S. C., dispatch, April 10, says: The trial of thirteen citizens of Lake City for having lynched Postmaster Baker began here today before Judge Brawley. There are 150 witnesses to be examined, but the end of the trial will probably be reached in two weeks. The keenest interest is shown in the proceedings and there is more anxiety felt now among the defendants than when the party was arrested last summer.

It seldom happens that the federal government goes to such expense in the preparation for a trial of cases down this way. There are more than eighty witnesses alone for the government, and Judge Brawley has signed an order directing seventy-three witnesses for the defense to appear. Besides the able legal force from the district attorney's office, the department has retained the services of ex-Attorney General Barber of South Carolina and Hon. J. P. Kennedy of Charleston. For months government inspectors have been at work.

When Government Inspector Bell got to work on some of the citizens of Lake City to get them to testify he found the witnesses slow. The men admitted they could not testify and hope to remain at Lake City to live. If they talked it meant that they had to move from that section. The government has failed, it is said, to take care of its witnesses, who believe it would be unsafe for them to return to Lake City.

Two of the men against whom indictments have been returned have turned states' evidence. They are Joseph P. Newham and Early P. Lee. Newham was suspected from the first and when arrested told the story. His
