FOUND THE LEAD.

Second Entry At Salado Again In Working Order—Track Laying Soon To Begin On Mountain Line—Other White Oaks Improvements.

"We have found coal again in our No. 2 entry at Salado," said General Manager Eddy of the El Paso and Northeastern this morning. "That is where the fault was, and by boring down with a diamond drill, we have found the lead again. Everything is in good shape, and the other entries are panning out well."

"How about the mountain line, Mr. Eddy?"

"Everything is progressing nicely and we shall begin tracklaying within two weeks."

"The shops at Alamogordo are going up right along, and we shall soon be able to use them extensively. We are just beginning to receive our new rolling stock, and both the road bed and transportation department of the road will soon be in fine shape."

WILL LAY OVER HERE

Alton Tourists From San Francisco Will Remain In El Paso Tonight And Tomorrow Morning.

Another tourist excursion from San Francisco to Chicago, known as the "Alton excursion," comes through El Paso this evening on the Sunset route, arriving here at 7 p. m. city time.

The passengers will lay over in El Paso until tomorrow afternoon, thus gaining an opportunity to see something of the city. At 2:15 the excursion goes out on the Texas and Pacific. It is to make closer connections of this sort that the T. P. time is to be changed.

From here the party will go to Texasiana where the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern road takes them into St. Louis. The run from there to Chicago is to be made over the Chicago and Alton. The westward excursion starts from Chicago tomorrow night.

CONNECTION AT LAREDO

Santa Fe Has Arranged For Another Route To Mexico From Kansas City.

While the Santa Fe and Mexican Central work together as a rule, and are trying to get their timetables to correspond, it is evident that the former road does not depend on its El Paso connection for accommodation all its Mexican traffic.

It has inaugurated a new train service and hereafter a through sleeper and chair car will run daily between Kansas City and San Antonio, Tex. The new service was put on to accommodate the many tourists who visit Mexico every year. Heretofore passengers for Mexican points have been compelled to take chances on making connection with the International & Great Northern for Laredo, but under the new arrangements the Santa Fe train that leaves Kansas City at 9:40 p. m. will arrive in San Antonio the second morning at 10 o'clock, making direct connections with International & Great Northern for Laredo.

WHAT WHITE OAKS WANTS.

Their Hope Lies In the Extension of the Rio Grande Road.

Now that the El Paso & Northeastern has announced that it will not extend its line eastward, the White Oaks people are beginning to study how they are to secure a railway connection. White Oaks is not on the railway from El Paso, says the New Mexican. The distance from White Oaks is probably seventy-five miles to where the Pecos Valley line could be tapped.

A spur of twelve miles would connect White Oaks with El Paso over the new line. But with this spur built by the Denver & Rio Grande as part of an extension from Santa Fe, a distance of perhaps 150 miles, White Oaks, the coal fields, gold mines and timber country, would be on a through line to Denver, that would pass through a productive country, tapping Albuquerque, and there connecting with the Santa Fe for east and west business.

The Denver & Rio Grande business in the southwest, via Santa Fe, is growing and some day the road will be extended to White Oaks and El Paso.

NEW STYLE TENDER

One With a Capacity of 5000 Gallons of Water and 15 Tons of Coal to be Used Shortly.

There will be seen in El Paso shortly a large and new style locomotive tender now being finished at the Santa Fe shops in Topeka. Its capacity will be about 5,500 gallons of water and about 15 tons of coal. This new tender, and all others like it which are to be built there, will be used on the heavy through freight runs, thus doing away with the necessity of stopping so often to take coal and water. The new tender is larger than ordinary tenders and differs in a few main points.

In making the tender larger the water capacity is increased and likewise the coal space. Also the collar of the tank is extended upwards and forms sides for the piling of additional coal. The top of the tank slopes gradually in towards the center and in this way the coal is by its own weight continually forced to the front where it can be easily used by the fireman. This feature will save the fireman from having to climb up on top of the coal to push it forward and prevents any amount of coal from falling on top of the tank.

FROM THE KLONDYKE.

A Returned Texan Tells Of The Riches Of The Cape Nome—Gold Field—Miners In Demand At \$10 a Day—The New Circle City.

Among the incoming passengers on last night's Southern Pacific was Mr. C. H. Armstrong, an ex-railroadman of Danison, Texas, who formerly ran on the S. P. and who is on his way home from Klondyke and the rich Cape Nome gold fields. He brings with him many samples of gold nuggets from the El Dorado and Bonanza claims and Circle City, and black gold bearing sand from Cape Nome. He is the owner of a claim at the Cape which he intends to work on his return in the spring.

"The Cape Nome district," said Mr. Armstrong, "is the richest yet found. The claims are all along the beach, and stretch away for miles in either direction. Thousands of people are there and the demand for miners is great. Here is a specimen of the sand from which the gold is washed."

The sand shown by Mr. Armstrong is a black sand not unlike, in appearance, that found on the Ortiz claims near Santa Fe, which the Edison company is about to work with its new magnetic process, or the black sand found in the arroyos back of Mt. Franklin. It is black with minute particles of iron ore, but this Cape Nome sand has so great a percentage of free gold that it has also a dull yellowish color.

"The Cape Nome country," continued Mr. Armstrong, "will, in my opinion, prove one of the richest, as it is now one of the most densely populated of the Alaskan gold bearing districts. While the original beach is all staked out in claims, there is as yet an unprospected beach which may prove as rich in gold bearing sand as the first one."

"Miners' wages in Alaska this season will be higher than ever, and \$10 probably will be the average price per day. Alaska is not a country for a poor man; most of them have realized that, and consequently there is but only well-to-do people for the most part are found there."

"Circle City, which was at one time almost deserted when the boom first came on, is now recovering, and is going to be the chief city of Alaska."

Mr. Armstrong left for home over the T. & P. this afternoon.

THE DEWEY KISS PATROL.

How The Admiral Was Saved From Feminine Osculation.

"While I was up at New York during the Dewey celebration," said a federal official last night, "I had an interesting talk with an old friend of mine who is in the secret service, and who was there on special detail to look after some of the distinguished guests. Just how many government detectives were on hand nobody knows except Chief Wilkie, and he isn't apt to tell, but there were enough to put a very prompt quietus on any crank or indiscreet enthusiast who might have been inclined to make things unpleasant."
