THE DEATH PENALTY.

JOSEPH BRINSTER'S EXPIATION OF A GREAT CRIME.

A Legal Hanging in the Far West—Scenes at the Gallows—History of the Brutal Outrage.

Special to the Gazette. Ysleta, July 5.—To-day at this place, the county seat of El Paso county, the majesty of the law was vindicated by the execution of Joseph Brinster, the soldier who committed rape on Mrs. Davis, at Fort Davis, Texas, about a year ago. He made no confession, but made a speech of twenty minutes, during which he took two big drinks of whiskey, his religious adviser taking the bottle from him once.

Deputy Sheriff Comstock placed the rope around his neck and adjusted the black cap. Brinster fell with a dull thud. The rope being placed upon the back of the neck, terrible contractions of the limbs followed. The rope finally slipping, Brinster was hurled by the trap of the platform, the rope replaced and adjusted, and then he was re-hung. Upon being cut down, the body was placed in a red-wood coffin and given in charge of the attending Catholic priest. Over 800 people were present and about thirty vehicles. The best of order prevailed.

BRINSTER'S CRIME.

The crime for which Joseph Brinster was executed was committed near Fort Davis, Texas, in the early part of February, 1882, and as to brutality it is without a precedent in the history of Presidio county. The details of his brutal outrage upon the person of Mrs. Mattie McF. Davis, a respectable lady living near that military post, were given to the press of the county at the time but a review may prove interesting.

At the dead hour of night Brinster, in an intoxicated condition, visited the house of his victim, and with an axe broke down a door, entered the bedroom of the poor, helpless woman, dragged her from a bed of pain, and at the point of a loaded musket demanded she yield to his hellish desire. The lady in order to save her life and with the understanding that he would go away, yielded to the brute. After accomplishing his object Brinster departed, but soon returned and by main force again outraged her. Before leaving the house the second night he returned like a mad-man, threw his almost insensible victim on the floor, hit and booted her in a shocking manner, the points of his boot heels being plainly visible on the lady's face and chest. Too weak to give the alarm, the poor woman remained as Brinster had left her until the following morning, when she was found in an almost dying condition by an attendant. A general alarm was given and in a few hours the surrounding hills and prairies were alive with detachments of United States troops and infuriated citizens in search of the villain. Every nook and corner was visited, but the culprit could nowhere be found. After three days and nights pursuit, Brinster was apprehended while boarding a train on the Southern Pacific railroad by Captain Neville, then of the state rangers. Finding himself in the hands of the stern officer, Brinster begged to be shot on the spot. He was assured his desire would be satisfied on the least attempt at escape, which, however, was not attempted. The prisoner was brought to Fort Davis under a strong military escort and placed in the prison guard-house, where he was confined until the excitement had somewhat subsided. He was shortly afterwards secretly turned over to the authorities, who for some time maintained extra guards at the jail, fearing an excited populace would take the law in their own hands. All that was needed was a leader, the responsibilities of which no one seemed disposed to shoulder.

Brinster was brought to trial at the spring term of the district court, pleading not guilty. He was ably defended, but the facts were overwhelmingly against him. The jury after a short deliberation returned a verdict of guilty, assessing the punishment at death. An appeal was taken, and through ignorance or carelessness on the part of the then district attorney in drawing up the documents, the prisoner was granted a new trial. The latter took place at Ysleta, in El Paso county, on a change of venue, the jury again finding him guilty as indicted, and assessing the death penalty. A second appeal was taken by Brinster's counsel, the proceedings of the lower court were affirmed by the appellate court, the sentence of the law being carried out at Ysleta.

Great interest was manifested by the people during the trial, the court room being densely packed throughout. It was with much difficulty that Mrs. Davis' testimony was obtained, her right eye being assailed causing her to swoon away. The accused displayed stolid indifference during his trial. But little is known of Brinster beyond his enlistment in the First U. S. infantry, where he was looked upon as a dissolute character. He was about twenty-six years of age, a little below the medium height, rather heavy. His face was one of average intelligence, his expression bold and open, and his conversation showed that of a person who had had some little schooling. He possessed a particular aversion for newspapers, hence he obtained as to his past life. He claimed to have been born in New Jersey, where he has a wife and one child living, and that the name of "Brinster" is an assumed one.

His many efforts to escape while confined in the Presidio county jail showed he was no novice in manipulating the most intricate irons. His ingenious inventions were a wonder to all. The acme of Brinster's ambition was to escape that he might kill his victim. With this in view, the prison authorities left nothing undone to hold their bird and considering the insecure condition of the jail and the hard character to deal with, they are to be commended for the manner in which they discharged their trust. The following is condensed from Brinster's dying statement:

My name is Joseph Brinster, I was born in New Jersey, where I have a wife and one child living, and that the name of "Brinster" is an assumed one. I was enlisted in the First U. S. infantry, where I was looked upon as a dissolute character. I was about twenty-six years of age, a little below the medium height, rather heavy. My face was one of average intelligence, my expression bold and open, and my conversation showed that of a person who had had some little schooling. I possessed a particular aversion for newspapers, hence I obtained as to my past life.
