At a meeting of the Nolan and Fisher county stock association, held at Sweetwater, August 17th, R. M. Clayton was chosen acting president and A. P. Moore acting secretary. It was decided to commence work on the fall round-ups September 15th.

Sweetwater division meets at "Eagle Pens" on Eagle creek, on the 14th of September. Works up Oak creek and tributaries, down Sweetwater creek and meet Clear Fork division at the mouth of Sweetwater creek.

Clear Fork division meets on the 14th of September at the mouth of Buffalo creek on Clear Fork; works up Clear Fork creek to its head, thence across the head of Buffalo creek to the head of Cottonwood creek, then down Cottonwood and Clear Fork creeks to the mouth of Sweetwater.
