Some very magnificent brocades

have just been imported, designed for

dinner and reception toilets, which

the rare antique Venetian fabrics. One

Broadway house, noted for its importa-

large dark-green vine leaves on a

ground of deep gold; a magnificent

black Turkish satin is brocaded

elegant, is a silver-gray brocade,

strewn with pale pink eglantine; an-

other of white satin brocade, with

bunches of silver grapes, and lastly, a

heavy Lyons satin of Persian make

of pinkish green, showing heart's ease

blossoms in deep purple and gold in

raised velvet.

fitting style will, in a measure at

The "pagoda" and "angel" sleeves are

to be worn, as well as the artistic

with sleeves cut close up to the shoul-

der and a puff at the elbow.

worn, that they must be buttoned after

they are put on. Later in the season

a narrow turned over cuff will prob-

ably be worn. The newest shape in

collars is a band of plain linen not less

than two inches high, which is lapped

in front and buttons in the band and

is called by the hackneyed name of

"duke."
