EVENTS ABROAD.

The German Socialists Make Large Gains in the Election of Members to the Reichstag.

Rumors of Ravages of Cholera Among Admiral Courbet's Forces—China Opposes Mediation.

GERMAN REICHSTAG.

BERLIN, Oct. 29.—Election returns come in slowly. Reports from the various urban districts indicate the election of eight members of the party of the Centre, three Conservatives, three National Liberals, three New German Liberals, and six Socialists.

GAINS FOR THE SOCIALISTS.

The result of the parliamentary elections in seventy-six districts is now known. In twenty-nine districts there was no choice and second ballots will be taken. In thirteen of these twenty-nine Socialist candidates are in the contest.

FRANCE AND CHINA.

AN UNHEALTHY ARMY.

PARIS, Oct. 29.—The Gaulois has forwarded a dispatch to Admiral Peyron, minister of marine, in which he describes in the darkest colors the sanitary condition of his men and expresses fear that he will be compelled to abandon the attempt to occupy Tamsui, in which event the admiral would leave two vessels to blockade that port.

ADVERSE TO MEDIATION.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Official advices from Peking have reached the Chinese embassy and been communicated to Earl Granville, the British secretary of foreign affairs.

Rumors have reached here via Shanghai that a severe type of cholera is spreading through the French squadron under Admiral Courbet now blockading Formosa.

THE EFFECT OF THE BLOCKADE.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—In consequence of the statement in commons by Lord Fitzmorris, under secretary for foreign affairs, that the neutrals must regard the French blockade of Formosa as the notification of a state of war between France and China, it is expected that the British ports will be closed to transports taking French troops to China.

EGYPTIAN AFFAIRS.

BAHI BAZOOKS DESERT.

CAIRO, Oct. 29.—It is learned that fifty Bahi Bazouks who were dispatched from Massowah in pursuit of marauders have deserted in a body.

GEN. WOLSELEY.

Gen. Lord Wolseley arrived to-day at Anbukol, in the province of the Upper Nile. The boatmen succeeded in getting 120 boats over the second cataract.

CABLE NOTES.

Intelligence has been received that M. Seignely has hoisted the French flag at Sagala and Kodili on the bay of Adeb. It is reported that France will annex them.

A DIRE CALAMITY ON THE PACIFIC.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., Oct. 29.—The following further particulars of the disastrous storms on the coast of Lower California were learned this morning. The news was brought here by the captain of the steamer Newbern from Guaymas.

THE STEAMER MAASDAM.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—No information further than that received last night has been received about the burning of the steamer Maasdam of the Netherland Steam Navigation company.

AN ENGINE EXPLODES.

BALTIMORE, MD., Oct. 29.—A freight engine on the Baltimore & Ohio railroad exploded at Locust Point this morning, instantly killing the engineer, Joshua Dixon, and the fireman, David Burke.

A SERIOUS BLAZE.
