Government Land Illegally Fenced.

OMAHA, NEB., Nov. 14.—In the case
of the United States Government vs.
the Brighton Ranch Company Judge
Crewer of the United States circuit
court decided that the company has
fenced in about 52,000 acres of land be-
longing to the government. The suit
was brought by the latter to compel
the company to tear down the fence.
The decision is in effect that the
Brighton Ranch company have no
right to build fences on government
land and the government has absolute
right to have the fences removed. If it
sees fit to exercise that privilege. He
granted a temporary injunction en-
joining the defendants from the con-
struction of any additional or cross
fences on the lands so inclosed, but
said that he would await a final hear-
ing before issuing a mandatory injunc-
tion requiring the removal of the
fence. This decision settles the law in
this circuit that cattlemen have no
right to inclose government lands for
herding purposes.
