SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Nov. 20.-Brigadier-Gen. Stanley, commander of this military department, has just published the following very severe reprimand o First Lieut. Josiah H. M. E. Conference and the Women's

published the following very severe reprimand of First Lieut. Josish H. R. King, Eighth cavairy, who was recently tried at Fort Clark and found guilty of negotiating his pay accounts long before due:

"From the record it is apparent that Lieut King only received \$115.87 out of \$146.67, the amount of his pay account for May, 1884; that he paid the sum of \$30.80, or 3 per cent. per month for being enabled to anticipate his pay. No officer of the army can pay such a percentage for the use of money and properly keep up his position. From observation it is known that officers who no badly manage their pay months before it is due, do not properly conduct the affairs of the government entrusted to them, and are in fact, of very little use to it. An officer who has been in the army for eight years who cannot be trusted by his friends for the value of a month's pay, is surely not a fit person to be entrusted with government funds. The officers of the army convicted of fraud and embezzlement commenced their downward career by violating paragraph 2550 of the regulations. The department commander has felt constrained to make the foregoing remarks on account of the extent to which the abuse has been carried by certain officers, as evinced by the stringent order recently published on the subject. A necessity for that order would not have arisen at all if the officers of the army fand recognized the principles that have sentrolled except in a few cases it is hoped that this trial will be a lesson to Lieut. A Constitution and By-Laws Adopted for the National Live Stock Association.

The Affairs of the Association Will be Vested in an Executive Comminee of Fifteen.

Judge Carroll's Resolution in Reference to a National Cattle Trail Adopted.

The Delegates Sit Down to a Two Hours' Banquet-The Coasts of the Evening.

The Moreing Session.

CONVENTION HALL, ST. LOUIS, MO., Nov. 20 .- At the opening of the national cattlemen's convention the chair announced the following gentlemen as the committee of conference with a similar committee of conference with a similar committee appointed by the thicago live stock convention: Gen. N. M. Curtis New York; Judge J. A. Carroll, Pexas; Gen. Brasin, lowa; Gov. Hadley, New Mexaco; Col. R. D. Hunter, Missouri; J. M. Calboro, Kansas; J. H. Lusk, Iowa; J. A. Cooper, Colorado; J. W. Hamilton, Cherokee Strio.

Sirip. Mr. Wood, chairman of the commit-Mr. Wood, chairman of the commit-tee on permanent organization, report-ed the constitution and by-laws of the proposed national association. The famer embodies eleven articles. The name of the association is to be the National Live Stock Association of america. Its chieff is to promote the inter at of the live stock industry, and it is to be open to any person directly interested in said industry on the pay-ment of an initiation fee of 610, and the annual dues not to exceed \$5. The ofment of an initiation fee of \$19, and the annual dues not to exceed \$5. The officers are to be a president, first vice president and one vice-president from each state and terratory and a secretary and trensurer. The secretary is to draw a salary. The hief office is to be at ist Louis until further ordered. The affairs of the association will be in the hands of an executive committee of fiftein, elected anoually, of which the president will be ex officio chatman. The first meeting of the association will be held tomorrow, at which office a will be cleeted. The annual meetings will be cleeted on the third Monday of each November at such place as ordered by the association.
