LONDON SHARBN BY ANOTHER EX-PLOSION.

LONDON, Jan. 2 -- A dynamite explosion occurred on the underground railway between Gower street and King's Cross sintion at 2:50 o'clock this evening. The windows creased. of a passing train were shattered and

of a passing train were shattered and the gas-light was extinguished. Beyond this there was no damage done. The passengers were greatly terrified but no one was hurt. The train resumed its journey after a delay of twenty-five minutes.

3.A. M.—The shock of the explosion was telt by the residents of Euston road, between St. Panara's church and Jude street. The railway runs the whole length of Euston road underneath the roadway. A conweapendily collected at the ventor-shaft at the head of Ossulton street, at which at the time of the explosion a quantity of smoke issued. As soon as possible, a number of parties were sent to the spet with lamps and app sances for clearing the line. Up to the present time nothing has been found. The residents in the locality are greatly allerned.

alarmed The shock overthrew several way-farers on the Easton road. It was with great difficulty that the horses were restrained from run-ning away. The gas lights to the Gower street station were ex-tingulated. The ticket-collector at the singulaned.
