

### DISCORDANT ELEMENTS.

Stock Reports Indicate That the Loss of Cattle and Sheep in Texas Has Been Great.

The Heavy Snow-Storm in the North Followed by a Blizzard—The Mississippi Overflowing.

Southern Spain Again Shaken by Earthquake—Great Suffering Among the People.

FROM OVER OUR STATE.

Caring for the Poor.

DALLAS, TEX., Jan. 17.—The weather is moderating and the snow has almost disappeared. A meeting will be held at the opera-house tomorrow afternoon to take steps for the relief of the poor. There are a number in the city without fuel or food.

Fifty bursted water-pipes were reported to the superintendent of the water-works to-day. The freeze did it.

Reports of dying sheep.

BURNET, TEX., Jan. 17.—Thursday night about midnight this section was visited by one of the severest snow-storms known for many years. The snow fell to the depth of two inches. All the streams adjacent to the city are frozen, and no wagons from the West have arrived since Monday last. The loss to cattle and sheep men is said to be very heavy. One man living a few miles from here is reported to have lost 300 sheep out of a flock of 700. A large number of stockmen who have been attending the stockmen's convention at Austin have returned.

At Weatherford.

WEATHERFORD, TEX., Jan. 17.—The weather has been very disagreeable for the last few days. All day Thursday it sleeted and late in the day it commenced snowing, and yesterday morning about two inches of snow was on top of the frozen earth. Today has brought no change.

At Waco.

WACO, TEX., Jan. 17.—The mercury this morning registered 10° above zero, the coldest weather we have had this winter. This spell will necessarily kill many cattle out on the range. Some heavy losses are already reported. The snow melted very little today.

At Sherman.

SHERMAN, TEX., Jan. 17.—It is very cold here, everything is covered with snow. Travel is suspended for the time. A bright sun and a clear sky this afternoon gave hopes of a speedy change for the better.

The cold spell is playing havoc with our Western cattle.

The west-bound train was delayed yesterday four hours.

Referring to Jefferson.

JEFFERSON, TEX., Jan. 17.—The river is booming. The lower grounds are overflowed.

The first snow of the season fell here yesterday. It is now freezing cold. Stock are suffering badly.

Loss of Cattle in Shacke Ford County.

ALBANY, TEX., Jan. 17.—The outlook to-day is anything but encouraging to our stockmen. A fine snow, mixed with sleet, is falling, and is made exceedingly disagreeable by reasons of a strong north wind. H. C. Jacob & Bro. have lost between eight and nine hundred sheep out of a flock of fifteen hundred. Very few other stockmen have reported any severe losses up to date. During the last cold, wet norther, cattle drifted to the number of twenty-five to fifty thousand and against the line-fence of J. B. Mathews & Sons, north of the Clear Fork, near Fort Griffin. Large numbers died and the probability is that the fence will have to be cut during this spell to prevent great loss.

Heavy Losses of Sheep Reported.
