## GAINESVILLE.

The Fourth Victim of the Recent Affray in the Nation.

GAINESVILLE, TEX., March 20.—Among the wounded at the shooting escape in the nation some weeks since, in which Henry Craig of this city was killed, was a young man named Mackey, who was shot three times. News just received from his home states that he lingered on in suffering until a few days ago, when he died, the fourth victim in this bloody affray. Dr. Modall of this city was on his way to a professional visit in the country, when his horse became suddenly frightened and jumped in such a way as to throw him against a wire fence. His clothes were badly torn, and the doctor narrowly escaped serious injury.

## An Important Test-Suit.

PITTSBURGH, PA., March 20.—The Humane society of this city entered suit to-day in the United States circuit court against the Pennsylvania Railway company, alleging that the recent act of congress, which provides a heavy penalty on all public carriers of live stock for failure to properly care for animals during transportation, has been shamelessly disregarded, the defendant company having allowed live stock shipped from Chicago to be on the road sixty-two hours without food, water or rest. The suit is a test one, and is brought at the suggestion of the agent of the National Humane society. Should the plaintiff win the case, an attempt will be made to enforce the act in all parts of the United States.

Barnard vs. Blum, from Galveston county; motion to withdraw transcript granted.

## DALLAS.

Grand Jury Out of Work—Dwellings Burned—Republican Bounced.

DALLAS, TEX., March 20.—Two fires occurred in the city last night. Mr. Hendricks had two houses destroyed and one partially burned. He had insurance, but his loss will approximate \$2500. The other house belonged to Mr. Lowden and was almost a total loss. He had no insurance. Mr. Johnson, who has had charge of the federal court grounds, was this morning discharged. Mr. Paul Jamison, who has charge of the building, is a Democrat and late appointee. It is the first blow of the ax.

The grand jury, which has been in session about two weeks, will adjourn on Saturday. It is the first grand jury of Dallas for years which ever admitted that it had no further work. As a proof of the orderly disposition of the people it is remarked that on yesterday for the first time for ten years the mayor's docket failed to show an arrest made the night before.

A case of Gaston & Thomas vs. the collector of this county was brought before Judge Aldridge this morning. The plaintiffs are bankers and brought a suit by injunction to restrain the defendant from selling certain property on which he had levied for taxes due on stock in the bank. The court perpetuated the injunction.

Covey, who was accidentally shot by Green a night or two ago, is better. The attending physician says he will recover.

## LONGVIEW.

LONGVIEW, TEX., March 20.—Rufus R. Harris, who attempted to kill J. T. Smith last week, as reported in THE GAZETTE at the time, died of erysipelas in the wound produced by the hatchet thrown by Cobb. Harris seems to have had "fighting spells," according to the statements of his friends, and it is thought that he was not really responsible for the shooting for that reason. Smith is attending to his business, having nearly recovered. Cobb claims to have acted in self-defense. He has left for parts unknown.

The Knights of Labor are to organize a lodge of fifty members here.
