CITY COUNCIL. Further Action in Regard to the Purchase of the Water-Works. The mayor called the aldermen together yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock p. m. Present: Mayor Smith and all the aldermen. After calling the meeting to order Mayor Smith handed the secretary a message, which was read to the council and is to the following effect: That he had negotiated and sold thirty of the second series of city bonds, \$30,000 to S. P. Cowan at the price of ninety-five cents on the dollar, \$28,500. Alderman Alexander presented a resolution approving the sale, which was adopted. A resolution was presented, allowing to Morgan J. News, president of the water-works company, the sum of \$25,000, in payment of the purchase of the water-works. When this resolution was presented and about to be acted on, City Attorney Jas. W. Swayne asked permission to make a few remarks, which was granted. He then read to the council the ordinance authorizing the issue of the 2nd Series bonds, and called the attention of the council to the fact that the city government did not have the right to pay for the water-works out of the money arising from the sale of bonds, which were issued for street improvements and construction of sewers. Some discussion took place, but in the end the resolution was adopted. An order was also adopted directing that the sum of \$1000 due the water-works company for hydrant rental be paid. The council then adjourned.

As it has been currently reported and circulated to my prejudice that I have full authority to appoint and discharge members of the police force, I take this method of correcting the misinformed on the subject. By referring to Ordinance No. 155, you can plainly see that the law says: SECTION 1. The regular police force of this city shall consist of the marshal as chief of police, and of such number of policemen as the city council may from time to time authorize by resolution and appoint. I have no authority by law to appoint any policeman, nor have I the right to discharge any policeman. As to whether or not I have reported to the police committee all misconduct of officers under my control I respectfully refer you to Messrs. Flanagan, Aldridge and Andrews, police committee, and am willing to abide by their decision. I have not even the right to assign a policeman to a certain district without the approval of the mayor. Aldermanic. To the Editor of the Gazette. The spring election is rapidly approaching, and one of our most important duties is to select men to represent us as aldermen. With a council composed of such honest business men in whose hands to intrust the finances and see that only such legislation is enacted as will promote the interest of all parties alike, on a safe business principle, opposing all extravagant and unnecessary expenditures. In the selection of such representatives we should make our choice from among our prosperous business men, and with a council composed of such men, presided over by our honorable mayor, we will command such respect both at home and abroad as will give Fort Worth such a boom as she never before experienced.

DALLAS. Colored Pilferers Arrested—Judgment Against the Texas Central. Special. DALLAS, TEX., March 28.—Last night about 7 o'clock the room of Miss Effie Morland, at Mr. Porter's boarding-house on Ross avenue, was entered by burglars, a trunk broken open and a watch and chain valued at \$150 carried off. A negro named Henry Langley, who formerly worked for Mr. Porter, was suspected and an officer put on his trail. He was captured when about to board a freight train, and when searched the watch was found in his possession. He was locked up. About the same time Mrs. Rose, a teacher at the Female college, discovered that her room had been entered and \$31 in money and a lot of jewelry taken. Emma Garrett, a colored servant, was suspected and arrested, but declared "fore do Lawd" she did not take it, but upon her house being searched the valuables were recovered.

She was placed in line of promotion for the poor farm by Justice Schall. Joe Pulsar was locked up this evening on an indictment from the grand jury. Joe was mixed up in the Humphries shooting scrape some time ago, and this may be the reason for his incarceration. The case of Clayton Miller and wife vs. the Houston & Texas Central railroad, for the killing of the son of the plaintiffs some two years ago, ended this morning. The jury rendered a verdict for \$500. Marshal Arnold received a telegram from Chatham, Canada, to-day saying that Baum had been held for extradition for forgery.

SPORTING. HANLAN BEATEN. SYDNEY, N. S. W., March 28.—In the sculling match, to-day, between Hanlan and Beach, the latter won by six lengths. AN EXCITING CONTEST. SYDNEY, N. S. W., March 28.—The race between Hanlan and Beach, was rowed over the "Champion's Course" on the Parramatta river. The attendance was enormous. The weather was favorable, the water smooth. Both rowmen were in excellent condition. Hanlan and Beach, after the start kept well together for some distance. The race was close and exciting. As the boats approached the winning post almost bow to bow. The excitement among the spectators was great when, pulling with all their strength for the winning post, Beach overhauled Hanlan and increased his advantage till the very finish amid the wildest excitement.

UNIVERSITY BOAT RACE. PUTNEY, ENGLAND, March 28.—The university boat race between Cambridge and Oxford came off this morning. The river banks were lined with spectators. The water was smooth. The conditions favored the Oxford crew. Both got off well together. Oxford soon took the lead and maintained it to the end, winning by two lengths. LATER. According to the latest information, the victory for Oxford was more decisive than at first thought. They won the race by three lengths instead of two. The time of the race was 21 minutes and 36 seconds.

BRENNHAM. A Demented German Takes His Life Into His Own Hands. Special. BRENNHAM, TEX., March 28.—Fredrick Korth, a German sixty-nine years old, who lived five miles from town, committed suicide yesterday afternoon by hanging himself with a calf rope under the corn-crib shed. He dressed himself in clean clothes, hung his hat on a peg under the shed, adjusted a plank and jumped off. His feet nearly touched the ground. He had a fine, valuable farm, out of debt. He was in bad health. This was his third attempt to commit suicide. The deceased had resided in this county thirty five years.

OLDEST CITY IN AMERICA. The Anniversary of the Founding of Saint Augustine. Special. ST. AUGUSTINE, FLA., March 28.—The celebration of the landing of Ponce de Leon in 1512, and the founding of the city by Menendez, in 1565, was a grand affair. The entire city is decorated with Spanish colors. Old Fort San Marco is especially noticeable. The ceremonies consisted in a representation of the landing of Ponce de Leon. State Senator Genovar personated the Spanish discoverer. He was escorted by forty-six attendants in Spanish costumes with battle axes and glittering helmets to the inner quadrangle of the fort, where high mass was celebrated. After the service addresses were made by Gen. Gilson, commandant of the fort, and G. H. Fairbanks, the historian of Florida. After the speeches the troops of the garrison, the state military, the civil societies, the invited guests and the citizens paraded the principal streets. The procession was witnessed by 10,000 persons.

WACO. A Walking Arsenal Brought to a Halt—The Wool Clip Coming In. Special. WACO, TEX., March 28.—The Erie Telephone company has commenced the construction of its system from this city to Temple, which also puts Belton on the Waco telephonic circuit, now comprising over forty cities, towns and villages. A man named Freeman robbed a storekeeper in broad daylight this morning getting away with a pair of boots and some small articles. When arrested he was found to be a regular walking arsenal, having on a large six-shooter, a belt full of cartridges and a pair of brass knucks. He says he is from Henderson, Rusk county, and the officers think he is a dangerous character. The Teachers' associations of this county, white and colored, held their monthly meetings here to-day, there being about forty white and over twenty colored teachers present. The citizens of Waco will tender the visiting members of the Central Texas Cattlemen's association a grand ball and banquet at the McClelland opera-house on the night of April 8. Wool is coming in from Albany, Shackelford county, brought 1 1/2 cents for the round lot. Waco expects to market 1,000,000 pounds of wool this season. The contract for completing the Trinity Methodist Episcopal church building was let to-day. It will be one of the handsomest church edifices in the city. The sultry weather of yesterday has been succeeded by a norther.
