The citizens of Houston proposed to donate the land for all necessary buildings and subscribed to \$255,000 of the stock and the cattlemen of the state proposed to raise the remaining \$245,000.

The cattlemen succeeded in raising \$100,000, and for some time the matter remained in status quo.
