**Municipal Campaign Opened—List of
Officers and Candidates—Scene in
the County Court Room.**
A Jeweler and Pawnbroker Arrested—Fire
and Burglar Patrol Organized.
Editor Street's Challenge.

THE CITY CAMPAIGN.
Special to the Gazette.
DALLAS, TEX., Feb. 14.—The campaign
for city offices which are to be filled on
April 3 is in full blast. Not that the people
are becoming warmly interested, but that
the candidates are forcing the matter into
general notice by their unusual ur-
banity, their pleasing countenances, the
hearty grip of the hand, and the presenta-
tion of their cards and the distribu-
tion of cigars. The office of
assessor and collector has been
divided into two offices, making the
list of offices to be filled as follows:
Assessor, collector, marshal, superintendent
of waterworks, engineer and six
aldermen.

City assessor—For this office there is a
veritable scramble. Four gentlemen
aspire to the place: Captain Ben Melton,
L. M. Fargason, Joseph Blakeney and
David M. Spence.
Collector—This promises to be one of
the hardest contested battles of the cam-
paign. The three candidates are so well
known and so popular that it would be
a hard matter to forecast the winner.
The aspirants are, Assessor and
Collector Ford House, City Secretary W.
E. Parry and ex-Assessor and Collector
J. C. Bogel.
Marshal—This will be a clean-cut,
tooth-and-tongue race between the
present incumbent, J. C. Arnold and
Colonel W. F. Morton.
Superintendent of Waterworks—David
Hechner, the present incumbent, as yet
has no opposition. He will have, though,
as Dallas loves office too well to ever let
an office go begging for lack of candi-
dates.

Engineer—Only two have announced
themselves for this office, W. M.
Freeman and R. W. Haven. En-
gineer Thatcher, it is understood,
is waiting for the report of the committee
investigating the charges against him.
If the report, which will be made Wednes-
day night, results in his vindication, he
will be a candidate for re-election.
There is very little interest taken in the
aldermanic offices. It is understood that
the six members whose terms expire next
April will all be candidates for
re-election. It is not probable that they
will be opposed. No one is anxious, it
seems, to get into a place where he will
be compelled to share any responsibility
for those "Sighs of Despond"—the
streets of Dallas.

MRS. AHERN.
Mrs. Peter Ahern, wife of Officer Ahern
of the police force, died at her home on
Hawthorne street last night of apoplexy.
Her funeral, which took place this after-
noon, was attended by the police depart-
ment in dress uniform.
A SENSATION IN COURT.
This morning during the trial of the
case of William Allen vs. L. F. Smith,
trespass to try title, in the District court,
Colonel W. L. Crawford, defense, asked
Mr. McWhorter, witness for plaintiff, if
he knew of the whereabouts of a certain
document. McWhorter answered that he
supposed the document was in Colonel
Crawford's possession, and that
it was supposed to have been
stolen. This imputation aroused
the Colonel's Kentucky blood,
and he forthwith assaulted the witness
with his fists, and finally belabored him
over the head with a chair, inflicting an
ugly wound. At this time the woe
courtroom was in an uproar and his hon-
or's gavel was ineffectual in restoring
order. When the deputy sheriffs finally
succeeded in restoring quiet, the judge
fined the two participants \$25 each.

A JEWELER ARRESTED.
Emory Hall, a jeweler and pawnbroker
on the corner of Elm and Sycamore, was
arrested to-day on the charge of know-
ingly concealing a diamond ring, the
property of Mrs. M. Sues, valued at \$90.
The ring was stolen Sunday by a neg-
ro boy named Albert Johnson and sold to
Hall for a trifling sum. When the darkey
was arrested he confessed to having
stolen the ring, and told where he had
disposed of it. When an officer called on
Hall the ring was returned minus the
setting. The darkey avowed that the
setting was in the ring when Hall re-
ceived it.

FIRE AND BURGLAR PATROL.
O. H. Meiser, formerly of the Galves-
ton police department, is here organizing
a fire and burglar patrol. The object of
it is to make incendiaries and burglary
an impossibility. Private citizens who
live out of the range of police protection
are to support the system by the payment
of a small sum each month. Dallas is
the champion burglar town in the south-
west, and the town is to be congratulated
at having struck upon a system that will
give her relief from the numerous house-
breakers and crooks that infest her bor-
ders.

DIVORCES.
N. S. Simonds filed his petition to-day
praying for a divorce from his wife. The
petition cites that they were married on
August 9, 1884, and lived together until
February 8, 1888, when she proved un-
faithful to him.
Mrs. Lou Smith was granted a divorce
from Marlon Smith in the District court
to-day. They were married on the 10th
of January, 1884, and lived together for
three weeks, when he, without cause,
abandoned her.

MISER MATTERS.
A northern, attended by a drizzling rain,
struck the town about 4 o'clock this after-
noon. One fair day a week is a good
average for Dallas now.
J. Fisher, charged with slandering his
wife, pleaded guilty and was fined \$100
and costs in the County court this morn-
ing.
G. H. Aylworth, of St. Louis, is here
looking for his son, George D. Aylworth,
who disappeared from St. Louis two
weeks ago. The young man is 23 years
of age.
Officer Turnell, while assisting in the
removal of an arch on the site of the new
city hall this morning, had the misfortune
to have the structure fall on his leg. His
injuries will confine him for some time.
Editor Street in referring to the ball
game of Sunday acknowledges the Fort's
superiority, but issues a challenge: "Fort
Worth's bull dog whipped a Dallas dog
about a year ago, and now that town has
triumphed in base ball. But here and
now, we dare Fort Worth to meet Dallas
in a church choir contest."

ATTEMPTED WIFE MURDER.
James McCowan Cuts His Wife at Sher-
man.

SHERMAN, TEX., Feb. 14.—One of the
most desperate attempts at wife murder
ever recorded in the county occurred at
the Blanchard hotel in this city about
noon, the facts concerning which are as
follows: Mrs. L. J. Norton owns and
operates the Blanchard hotel and with
her lives her son-in-law, James McCowan,
and his family and also two daughters,
one of them a Mrs. M. E. Stevens and the
other Miss Lillian Norton. McCowan has
been for several years in the employ of
the street car line, and recently as brake-
man on the St. Louis, Arkansas and Texas
Railway. Last night he quarreled with
his wife about some family matters, and
in a desperate mood threatened to
kill their child by poisoning it, if
simply to obtain revenge for the
little differences between himself
and wife. To-day he entered his
wife's room and laying hold of her made
a desperate effort to kill her by cutting
her throat with a large pruning knife.
Mrs. McCowan screamed, and her mother
and sisters ran to her assistance and
took hold of the desperate man, who
turned his knife toward them, cutting
each one of them severely. Several men
boarding in the house ran to the rescue,
and their timely assistance probably
saved the lives of one or more of the
women. McCowan was taken in charge
by the officers and lodged in jail to await
trial on a charge of assault to murder.
The wounds received by Mrs. McCowan
about her throat and face are quite seri-
ous though not necessarily fatal. Those
received by her sisters were severe cuts
about the arms and body. Mrs. Norton
purchased and has been operating the
Blanchard house since last summer, and
states that she has had to maintain his
family most of the time and that Mc-
Cowan's failure to provide for them was
the cause of the quarrel which gave rise
to the unfortunate occurrence.

THE CATTLEMEN KICK.
They Will Not Pay the Cattleman Nation
\$1 per Head Tax.

ARDMORE, I. T., Feb. 14.—The farmers
of Picketts county, Chickasaw nation, held
a meeting here to-day and adopted the
following resolutions: We, the non-
citizens of Picketts county, Chickasaw
nation, I. T., in mass-meeting assembled
to devise means for the better protection
of our property and persons, do declare
that we are not intruders, that we are
here by permission of the Chickasaw
authorities and under contract with citi-
zens of the nation.
Resolved, that we recognize the great
principles and one of the articles of the
constitution of the United States of
America, that taxation without represent-
ation is unjust and not to be tolerated by
American citizens.
Resolved, that we recognize no legal
jurisdiction of this Indian government
over our property.
Resolved, that the high-handed conduct
of their so-called tax collectors has be-
come unbearable and has more the re-
semblance of highway robbery than tax col-
lecting.
Resolved, that we pledge ourselves and
will resist by all means in our power the
unjust collection of \$1 per head on our
cattle.
Resolved, as the Indian government has
no civil process for the collecting of
said tax, that we resist the same until a
decision shall be reached by the United
States government, the only government
to which we owe allegiance, and we here-
by invite all non-citizens who believe in
standing for their rights like men to
join us.

**SHOOTING SCRAPE IN THE TERRI-
TORY.**
Two Brothers In-Law Quarrel Over Eleven
Bushels of Corn.

GAINESVILLE, TEX., Feb. 14.—The
following particulars of a shooting scrape
at Jimtown, I. T., on Saturday evening
last reached here to-day. It appears that
the participants, John Cody and Oscar
Smith, are brothers-in-law who were
living together. They had a disagree-
ment about eleven bushels of corn and
after the passage of a few angry words
Cody armed himself with a shotgun and
proceeded to Smith's room with the evi-
dent intention of shooting him, but before
he could get his gun in a position to
shoot Smith seized a pistol that was
near at hand and fired a shot at him, which
failed to take effect, and before he could fire a second
time Mrs. Cody managed to shut the door
between them and thereby avoided the
killing of one, or perhaps both of them.
Smith left the house shortly after the dis-
culty, and has not been heard from since.

nights ago were captured at Texarkana
Sunday, and carried to Paris and lodged
in jail yesterday to await their trial.

ROUND-UPS.
**Sheep Raising in Texas Would Pay if
the Present Prices Would Hold
All the Time.**
Freight Saved by Shipping in Good Cars—
Is Pays Better to Drive—Good Beef
in the Panhandle.
Dates are being announced of the meet-
ings of the various cattlemen's conven-
tions throughout the state.
Bottom seems to have been knocked out
of the New Orleans beef market. Good
cattle are going for almost nothing.
Mr. S. Karr has purchased for the Five
Wells Cattle Company, of which he is
manager, sixteen cow ponies from Young,
Andrews & Kuhlen. These dealers are
shipping a carload of mules to-day to
Helena, Ark.
A couple of Lavaca county stockmen
propose starting a drove of 2500 two-year-
old steers for the northwestern markets
about March 1. They will drive instead
of shipping, considering that the more re-
munerative plan.
S. M. Forbis was in the city yesterday
with a bunch of steers from Mustang
creek, which he had brought in on the
Fort Worth and Rio Grande. He has
sent some beef to Chicago. The cattle
have been put through on cotton seed and
are looking first rate.
Mutton is in great demand, not only in
Fort Worth but in the northern markets.
The prices ruling for good sheep are com-
paratively high. A gentleman experi-
enced in sheep raising said yesterday if
the prevailing prices would hold all the
time, the feeding and fattening of sheep
in Texas would be a profitable industry.
As an evidence of the fine cattle raised
in the Panhandle and the mild winter of
that section of country, the Canadian
Crest mentions the fact that a cow re-
cently butchered for one of the butcher
shops weighed 592 pounds when dressed.
This beef was very fat, though the animal
had nothing but hay to eat during the
winter.
A Montana stockman who shipped a
great many cattle from that state to Chi-
cago last year in well arranged stable
cars, says he earned his freights by the
operation. That is, the prevention of
springs and loss of flesh by the extraor-
dinary accommodations of these cars
amounted to more than the charges for
transportation.
Mr. John Mulhall, a representative of
the commission house of Hunter, Evans
& Co., of the northern markets, was in
the city yesterday. The people he repre-
sents do not propose to be left out of the
trade to be had at the Union live stock
yards at Fort Worth; and his business
here now is to open up an office and es-
tablish an agency of his house in this city.

Murder and Suicide.
BERLIN, Wis., Feb. 14.—A terrible
tragedy was enacted in this city last even-
ing, J. W. Hacker of Danville, Ill., shoot-
ing and killing Mayle Steike of Bell Plain,
Iowa, and then blowing out his own
brains. Hacker was nineteen years old
and his victim one year younger. The
tragedy is the result of a love trouble.
Marriage was opposed by the girl's par-
ents. It is thought that Hacker asked
Miss Steike to marry him and on being
refused took her life and his own in a
frenzy of desperation.
