THE TANGIER AFFAIR.

The Department of State Issues a Statement Explaining the Nature of the Trouble.

To Provide Efficient Mail Service with Foreign Companies—The Chinese Treaty Ratified by the Senate.

Senator Edmunds Makes an Adverse Majority Report on the Fisheries Treaty. A Minority Report Submitted.

AN UNDERSTANDING REACHED.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The following statement in regard to the Tangier affair is issued by the Department of State:

It is not true there has been any refusal by the Sultan of Morocco to arbitrate. He proposed to Mr. Lewis some weeks ago to send a special agent to Tangier to discuss with Mr. Lewis the matters of difference, all questions upon which they could not agree to be referred to some third person.

THE POSTOFFICE APPROPRIATION.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Senator Frye today introduced in the Senate the amendment heretofore proposed by him to the postoffice appropriation bill to provide more efficient mail service between the United States and Central and South America and the West Indies.

THE SENATE IN EXECUTIVE SESSION.

The Senate in executive session today ratified the Chinese treaty without division.

Senator Edmunds has reported the fisheries treaty, adversely submitting a written majority report, and Senator Morgan submitted a minority report.

REFERRED TO A SUB COMMITTEE.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—At a meeting of the Senate committee on judiciary to-day no action was taken on the nomination of Melville W. Fuller to be Chief Justice except the formal reference to a subcommittee.

THE MYSTERIOUS EXPRESS ROBBERY.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—There are no new developments at the Treasury Department in regard to the missing \$41,000 of the American Exchange National Bank. Detectives were at the office of the express agent in the building to-day investigating the matter.

ELIGIBILITY FOR APPOINTMENT.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—R-O representative Charles E. Brown of Ohio to-day introduced a bill modifying the civil service law. It makes eligible for appointment without being required to pass civil service examination all honorably discharged federal soldiers and sailors of the late war upon satisfactory evidence of good character and capability.

TRYING TO OPEN THE TELEPHONE CASE.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—A petition for rehearing of the Bell Telephone case was filed in the clerk's office of the Supreme court to-day by the counsel for the People's Telephone Company who claim that Daniel Drawbaugh is the real inventor of the telephone.

THE BRAND OF GAIN.

Two Convict Guards Brought Pursued, Charged with the Murder of an Ex-Convict.

A Reward Offered by the Governor. Deposited in the State Treasury. A Charter Filed.

A Host of One of the Dead and Gone Politicians of Texas to be Presented to the State.

MURDEROUS GUARDS.

AUSTIN, Tex., May 7.—Governor Ross received a letter to-day from Colonel Gore of the state penitentiary stating that an ex-convict (colored) was murdered a few days since at Sartartia, and that the guilty parties were suspected and were now being pursued; by an armed posse. The evidence is almost conclusive that the killing was done by two convict guards who decamped immediately after the murder occurred.

PRESENTED TO THE STATE.

To-day Governor Ross received a letter from Professor Jacob Bickler of Galveston, stating that he had been authorized by the eminent sculptor, Miss Elizabeth Ney, to present to the state of Texas, a bust of the lamented Colonel Schleichner, ex-Congressman from this district, and asking if his excellency would receive the same and give it a place in the new capitol.

CAPITAL NOTES.

The Arkansas editors arrived to-day, and opened their eyes wide at the new granite capitol. The comptroller deposited \$11,000 in the State Treasury to-day of which \$600 goes to the general revenue and the balance to special funds.

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
