ROSS AND MARTIN.

They Address Five Thousand People at Sunset--Both Make Exhaustive Speeches--Governor Wheeler There.

Colonel August Belmont Will Run for Congress on a Protective Platform Against Hon. J. D. Sayers.

ROSS AND MARTIN AT SUNSET. Special to the Gazette. SUNDAY, OCT. 13.—The city has been a gala day for sunset. Fully 5000 people assembled here to-day to hear Governor Ross and Martin Martin speak. The program was furnished by the Grattan and Alford Concerted Band. Speaking began at 10 o'clock, and the opening address was by Judge F. E. Piner. Governor Ross was the next speaker, and for two long hours he discoursed pure Democratic doctrine in a most eloquent manner. He was heartily applauded, and his speech was well received.

Next speaker was Governor Wheeler, who delivered a Democratic speech which will be sure to have its effect. Governor Wheeler is a fine speaker and was cheered from the beginning to the end. Everything passed off quietly and pleasantly.

Republican candidate in the Tenth District Special to the Gazette. SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Oct. 13.—At the meeting to-day in this city of the Republican Tenth Congressional district convention Colonel A. Balknap, president of the San Antonio Street Railway Company, was unanimously nominated for Congress to oppose Hon. J. D. Sayers, the Democratic nominee. Colonel Balknap will have his formal letter of acceptance ready for publication by Tuesday or Wednesday. He will make the race on a strong protection platform as opposed to Mr. Sayers' alleged free trade course in Congress. The Republicans, who were here to-day from all parts of the district, seemed confident of success, and contented that they could easily carry Travis, Williamson, Bexar, and two or three large counties in the district, and be able to defeat Mr. Sayers.

DECATUR.

Attempt at Highway Robbery. Special to the Gazette. DECATUR, TEX., Oct. 13.—Yesterday morning Joe Deadlove and his son Joe, two German farmers who live in the southwest part of this county, came to Decatur with three bales of cotton, sold to H. P. Rice & Co., and after doing their trading started home late in the evening with only \$25 to \$30 of the money. Before they got to the West Fork two men passed them whom they recognized as two men they had seen in the morning at Bridgeport, when on their way to Decatur with the cotton. The Deadloves crossed West Fork before sundown and stopped at a house to get a drink of water, and these same men passed them again and had evidently laid in wait for the Deadloves in the West Fork bottom. One failed to molest them on account of being too early. A short distance from where they passed the last time was Otteen Creek, and when the Deadloves got there it was growing dark, and they met one of these same men, who called to them to halt, which they did not do, and the highwayman fired upon them with a pistol, which frightened their horses. The horses ran off with the wagon and men, and left the wagon and bales of cotton in the hands of the robbers in the darkness. The robbers were entirely unarmed. One shot from the highwayman's pistol took effect in young Deadlove's hand and another grazed the old man's trousers, and indicated a flesh wound in his shoulder. Only one man was seen, but the other was evidently near by, and from their actions before they were certainly acting together. The place of the attempted robbery was six miles southwest in H. P. Rice's report, and the information was not communicated to the Sheriff here until 10 o'clock this morning, which gives the victors nearly twelve hours the start of the robbers.

In the county court last night Lillard & Co. received judgment against the Fort Worth and Denver City Railroad Company for \$291.50 as a penalty for refusing to deliver a car load of freight for the money called for in the bill of lading until two days after tender of payment.

PARIS.

A Railway Damage Suit Results in a \$10,000 Verdict. Special to the Gazette. PARIS, TEX., Oct. 13.—The jury in the case of Chesley W. McLean against the St. Louis and San Francisco Railway Company for \$15,000 returned a verdict last night in favor of McLean for \$10,000. The railway will appeal to the Supreme court.

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WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Judge John T. Harcourt addressed the Democratic club of this city last night at the courthouse. His speech was solid Democratic doctrine and one of the best Democratic speeches listened to by the people of this city for a long time. He reviewed the history of the Democratic party from its origin to the present, showing where it had always been the friend of the laboring people and advocated their rights under the constitution of the United States. He also dwelt extensively on the present issues of today, and made every Democrat proud that he was a Democrat, and those that were not Democrats wish they were. The Judge was listened to with marked attention and was frequently loudly applauded.

John D. Stewart at Galveston. Special to the Gazette. GALVESTON, TEX., Oct. 13.—There was a rally of the various political parties at the courthouse this afternoon, the first jointly of the campaign.

What are we here for? That was the first speaker who delivered an inspiring speech and he was heartily applauded. J. H. Lippard of Hill county was the next speaker, taking the Union side. He tried to make it appear that something was wrong politically, but without any success. Colonel Sparks of Montague county concluded for the Democrats. He exposed the errors of Panagan's speech and gave ideas. His speech throughout was able, argumentative and eloquent.

At Rockdale.

ROCKDALE, TEX., Oct. 13.—Considerable interest is being manifested by the people of Rockdale and vicinity in politics. Overshadowing every other consideration just at present are the respective claims of Hon. Roger Q. Mills and Colonel B. L. Hays to represent the Ninth district in the next Congress. The two local papers are divided on this issue, the Messenger, as heretofore, being an ardent advocate for Mills, and the Reporter being equally as zealous in its labors for Hays. The friends of both are working hard, and it largely depends upon who will be the largest factor in the election two years ago.

Senator Estlin Talks. Special to the Gazette. WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Senator Estlin of Louisiana, who has just returned from a visit to New England, says he was surprised to find a majority of the young men in Boston taking and working for the Democratic party. In many instances the sons of famous Republican statesmen are voting Democratic principles. Among them are the sons of William Lloyd Garrison and Governor Andrew, and men of similar standing in the Republican ranks. He is confident that if the same men were elected, as a majority of the people of this country favor a reduction of taxation. In every grade of society taxation is odious and the people are beginning to realize that the Democratic party is in earnest in its promise to try to reduce it.

EL PASO DEMOCRACY. Special to the Gazette. EL PASO, TEX., Oct. 13.—The Democratic club held an open-air meeting last evening in the little plaza. It was certainly the most satisfactory meeting of the season thus far. The Fifth Infantry band furnished the key of music and the band, the speakers and the crowd marched from the Democratic Club headquarters on El Paso street to the little plaza. W. G. Jewell presided at the meeting, which was addressed by Colonel W. T. Stewart of Santa Fe, N. M., and Judge Edwards of this city. The band made magnificent speeches. The speakers confined themselves quite closely to the tariff question. They were often interrupted by loud applause. The meeting was very spirited and enthusiastic.

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BERLIN, Oct. 13.—Only a summary of Dr. MacKenzie's book is yet accessible to the public here, but enough is known of its contents to arouse savage indignation in official circles. Putting aside the medical disputes, the program which Dr. MacKenzie levels at Prince Bismarck of inciting the German doctors to entrap him into a doubtful declaration as to the nature of the Emperor's disease are felt to be a poisonous slander on the reputation of the Chancellor. The simultaneous appearance of the letter of the Emperor to Dr. MacKenzie lauding his treatment is held to prove concerted action to blacken Prince Bismarck's character. Dr. MacKenzie's attack on Dr. Gerhardt and Bergmann can be answered in the courts of law here or in England, and can be met also by the opinions of eminent European specialists not German, but Prince Bismarck is powerless to deal with Dr. MacKenzie. He will, however, use every resource of his craft to render the Emperor Frederick powerless to do him further harm.

Reports were circulated yesterday regarding the theft of a cipher code from the Emperor's room, which indicates the Chancellor's game of surveillance over the ex-Emperor, which ceased by the order of Emperor William after her surrender of Frederick's papers, will be renewed. A watch will be kept over the partitions and her movements, including her proposed visit to Windsor. The Progressist press are using the Guffcken and MacKenzie revelations as a basis for

HOSTILE CRITICISMS. Meanwhile Prince Bismarck is having had time to suffer from a renewed attack of gout in a serious form, partly arising from worry. Reports as to his health are causing the greatest anxiety to his family, and he is said to be confined to his bed in a few months. Whatever his condition may be, he does not cease working. During the week there has been a flood of communications between Frederick, Rome and Vienna. Prince Bismarck also directs the Guffcken inquiries and has been in correspondence with Herr von Bennigsen, Herr Miquel and others on the Landtag elections, and has held conference with Herr von Boetticher, Vice-President of the Prussian Council of Ministers, his indomitable spirit surrounding physical pain. The Progressist forecast of his retirement have been deservedly rebuffed by the Official Press.

The Progressist overlooks the fact well known in official circles, that the Emperor William's experience in Vienna and Rome have riveted him closer than ever to Bismarck, whose policy has made him feel helplessly reliant upon the assistance of the Chancellor. The Schadenfreude of the Progressist, and the Emperor Bismarck's embarrasments is going beyond judicious bounds, and may lead to a revision of feeling among the numerous sections of the people now inclining to blame his whole line of domestic policy since the appearance of the Guffcken revelations. He is certainly sided with Doctors Bergmann and Gerhardt against Dr. MacKenzie's aspersions, yet the Progressist papers select the most offensive passages for prominent comment. Emperor Frederick's autograph system, "Bergmann's stat mich schlicht behandel," "I made the theme of a political doctrine quite out of sympathy with German sentiment.

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
