Want Two Months. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 3.—President Edward Hewins of the Cherokee Strip livestock association, is in the city. To a reporter to-day he said strenuous efforts are making to influence the president to extend the time set for evacuation of the Cherokee Strip by cattlemen two months, or until December 1.

### Speculative.

#### Rock Island's Weakness the Interesting Feature in 'p'active Circles—Resum.

Special to the Gazette. NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—The weakness of Rock Island was the topic of absorbing interest in the streets. This morning the rumor that a dividend will be passed is strenuously denied by the company's officers. It is conceded, however, that the road is making little, if any, money at present. Three dividends of 1 per cent, each have been paid this year. The next one is due in November. Last year's dividends paid amounted to 4 per cent., in 1888 to 6 1/2, and for seven years previous to 7 per cent. The price of stock is now the lowest since 1877, when 8 1/2 was touched. The refusal of the New York market to boom yesterday caused the London market for Americans to drop this morning, and our own opening market followed suit. Under Rock Island's bad leading the rate became lower and lower during the morning, and finally some loans were made flat. Bad trusts were stronger. St. Paul earnings for August, as reported show an increase of \$109,408. Sugar was inclined to weakness. In early hours the general market was lifeless and figures little changed. In the last hour, the bear party attacked Burlington and Quincy and attracted generally. The closing prices were below yesterday's close. Although money was plenty and cheap, the silver offered to the government to-day aggregated 2,003,500 ounces, of which 200,000 were purchased, 100,000 at \$1.19 1/2, and 200,000 at \$1.19 1/4. #### Formation of a Company to Transport Texas Meats—A Big Enterprise.

The Louisiana ice works will be utilized as the cold storage warehouse.

### BURNED TO DEATH.

#### A Kerosene Lamp Explodes, Burns a Boy, and Three Occupants.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 3.—By the explosion of a coal oil lamp early this morning at 1504 Germantown avenue, a building was set on fire and Mrs. Sarah McIntyre, sixty years old, Mamie McIntyre, her ten-year-old daughter, and Sarah Logue, seventeen years, burned to death. The police have arrested Charles McIntyre, son of the dead woman, on suspicion of having caused the fire. Several other persons were in the building and were rescued with difficulty. Mrs. McIntyre was taken out of the house, but rushed frantically back to save her child and perished in her heroic effort.

### Manchester Trade Review.

MANCHESTER, ENG., Sept. 3.—The Guardian in its commercial article says: Although there is occasionally an increase in inquiry, the market on the whole is not active. Sales only moderate. Prices yesterday yielded a point in some departments, especially the yarn department. There is moderate demand for minor foreign and home markets, for the tendency is slightly in favor of buyers. Effective demand for yarn is poor. Cloth is irregular, best plain goods were sold. Prices firm in most other lines. Orders were wanted. The position of manufacturers regarding quotations has decidedly improved, owing to a decline in cotton yarn, but the chances of selling important quantities are not frequent.
