Letter From Roy Garner, Porto Corsini, Italy, 12-6-1918. Mr. E. K. Smith, Snyder, Texas.

Dear friend: Will answer your letter I just received, was more than glad to hear from you, I had began to think you had forgotten me as I had wrote you three letters and a card or two.

I sure was glad to hear you had had good rains, I am sure you were in need of rain very much, Guess most of the farmers will sow a large amount of small grain and if they make a large crop and that they get a good price for their products, I sure wish I could be at home this fall so I could buy a few bags of cotton, but as my country called for men to help defend its name and honor (and we have the best country on earth) and if I had not answered the call I could not have looked any one in the face with a clear conscience.

Guess you all are rejoicing over the great victory we have won. The people over here sure are.

I am in the country what is known as sunny Italy and when I first came here I thought the name suited the country, but now I have changed my mind, the past two months we have had nothing but rain, bog and cold weather with some snow and sleet. Almost every morning the ground is frozen but we don't mind the cold weather as we have clothes to meet the weather and a warm place to sleep.

I have seen some wonderful places since my enlistment, among them is Monte Carlo, I have seen some of the oldest places history knows of, I have been on the inside of a church building much older than Christ. I could name you several places of interest but haven't the time.

I was in France about two months and it sure is a great country. You should have seen me the first time I was under the enemy's fire,

I thought the skies were full of planes and that each plane carried at least one hundred bombs and that they all were after me, I could see the shells burst in the air and I thought they were bombs.

I must close for this time. Give my best regards to everyone.
