THE NEGRO FARMER.

The Agricultural and Industrial State Normal School at Nashville was not established for resident students alone, nor was it intended to influence classes only. The school was built by the state for the benefit of all the citizens to whom it may extend its influence. No class of citizenship will derive greater advantages from the existence of the Agricultural & Industrial State Normal School at Nashville than will the Negro Farmer, if he will only appreciate and take advantage of the opportunity which the school offers him. The school means to keep in close touch with the Negro Farmer of the state. It invites him to attend, at the school, a farmers' conference once each year. At these conferences men of experience and training will address farmers upon the latest and most approved methods of farming, point out to them facts of importance and show the cultural methods which mean larger quantities of a better quality of crops and hence larger returns to the farmer.

The school will send lecturers into their communities to give instructions similar to those given at the farmers' institutes on the school grounds. Thus the school intends to help the farmer and asks only that the farmer interest himself in his own behalf and put himself in an attitude to receive the instructions which the school offers.

This letter is addressed to every Negro farmer in the state of Tennessee and to every officer of farmers' organizations and fair associations. The school stands for the material advancement of the farmer and every Negro farmer in the state, whether he owns land or not, is requested to send his name and address.
