Not in the history of the Baptist Ministers Conference was so much discussion indulged in on the subject of baptism as was precipitated last Monday morning. The cause of the argument was a paper presented by one of the ministers on baptism. It was said to be one of the most scholarly presentations that has been heard before any religious organization, but since it is known that Baptists throughout the country believe in baptism—and since this was touched upon in a way not generally conceded to be right by most of the Baptists, it stirred up quite a deal of discussion. The critic of the Ministers' Conference was the reader of the paper and it was learned from the chairman that on next Monday morning a free discussion will be allowed on the paper and while it is said this discussion will not change the Baptist doctrine one whit much is expected to come from this, which will be information to the Baptist ministers.
