MILITARY TRAINING IN SCHOOLS.

Our educational institutions that have shown fitness have been asked by the United States Government to throw open their doors for the military training of our men and boys in order to properly fit them for better service. Among the schools of this city that have already begun this training are Fisk University and Meharry Medical College. From the class of men who have already reported for the school year, it is noticeable that they have been of a very high, intellectual order and the authorities of the schools are to be congratulated for the earnestness of purpose that has characterized their efforts in assisting the Government in furnishing this training, by placing every equipment of the school at the disposal of the War Department.

The appearance of three Negro lieutenants in this city this week, two to be stationed at Meharry Medical College and one at Fisk University for the military instructions of the boys at that school is attributed to the far-sightedness of Mrs. Hubbard and McKenzie, and we congratulate them for being able to bring to the attention of the War Department the important fact that the bringing of these Negro commissioned officers will not only increase the morale of the Negro citizens towards the winning of the war, but will inspire the Negro youth to reach after higher things.

The personnel of the faculty of both institutions has been of the best in that the faculty from president down has exercised far-sightedness and enforced discipline on each and every occasion, and we do not hesitate to

say that the Government has made no mistake in sending Lieut. Cooper, Lieut. Boyd and Lieut. Dawson to the schools here for the present school year.

TEACHING PREACHERS TO PREACH.

Conratulations should be extended to that wing of the Baptist family that is planning to open the theological and training school for the education of Baptist ministers and teachers in this city. While it is true the Negro Baptists outnumber all other denominations with their boasted claims of something like three million constituents, they have not had in this section of Tennessee since the destruction by fire of old Rezer Williams a school that would measure up to those of other denominations. It is also noticeable that since the abandonment of the theological department of Fisk University none of the schools here have given a complete theological training. Therefore, the pulpit has been neglected insofar as Nashville educational institutions are concerned. A trained gospel ministry, educated to preach the gospel and carry out the Great Commission is the one crying need of the hour.

THE PEACE OUR SOLDIERS WANT - THE PEACE OUR WAR MOTHERS WANT.

The Stars and Stripes, the official newspaper published by the soldiers of the American Expeditionary Forces in France, says editorially about the enemy peace offensive: "Let the week hearted who are dreaming of a compromise let the pacifists who are talking a peace by agreement; let the sideliners who have had enough of war; let the secretly inclined pro-Germans who think this war should end without a decision—let them on and all know once and for all that for the American Expeditionary Forces there is no such word as 'Peace' with the Hun unheeded. The man who talks of peace today, except through victory, is a traitor."

The enemy peace offensive is likened to the action of German machine-gun crews in the Vesle fighting, when they fought and killed Americans until they were surrounded, then shouted "Kamerad."

WOMEN IN WAR WORK.

Secretary McAdoo has designated October 5 as Women in War Work Day. "Millions of women in the United States are engaged in war work. Seven hundred thousand serve as active workers in the organization of the National Woman's Liberty Loan committees. Seventy thousand women are employed on the railroads. Hundreds of thousands of women are laboring in the munition factories. Other hundreds of thousands serve in clerical work directly related to the war. As many more are engaged in the Red Cross and other activities for the amelioration of war conditions. The women of America are doing their share in the winning of the war, both by actual work and by the tremendous force of their moral influence. It is fitting that their service should be memorialized, and Saturday, October 5, has been designated for observation in the Fourth Liberty Loan campaign as Women in War Work Day."
