

BUY A RED CROSS SEAL FOR PENNY NEXT FRIDAY; AID WHITE PLAGUE WAR

That Will Be Time When the "Widow's Mite" in This City Will Be Factor to Be Considered—Every Sticker Bullet in the Tuberculosis Fight

What are you doing with your pennies? Take care of them, we are told, and the dollars will take care of themselves.

It is good American coinage that they must materialize into now, though—dollars and dollars and dollars, and all for the Red Cross Christmas seals.

Next Friday is to be Penny day for that very purpose. Each year the San Francisco Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis inaugurates a sale of these little Red Cross "stickers" at one cent apiece for the nation wide fight against the dread disease which makes such inroads on the health of the people.

Five hundred thousand come here to be sold. There are busy sales women in the shops and the big office buildings; there are organizations of all sorts at work selling them. There is to be a "the dancin'" for the benefit of the fund—at which, by the way, no seals will be offered for sale. But next Friday will be everybody's day. That will be the time when the "widow's mite" in its multiplicity will be a factor to be considered. The Call will aid the association in

The Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis means what its name implies. Its organization was prompted by the knowledge that this disease is the scourge of modern times. Rich and poor alike are exposed to it and fall victims to it. The medical fraternity is a unit in believing that, taken in time, it yields to the right treatment. Allowed to develop, it seems to baffle the utmost skill.

AIDS VICTIMS THROUGH CLINIC

The association has its own ample quarters in Jackson street, where it maintains an efficient clinic served by the most expert physicians, who have at their disposal adequate equipment. Hundreds of cases are investigated there every month.

Often we are able to say to patients that they are not tubercular at all. When we find that they are, we tell them how to live and get well in the meanwhile how to avoid spreading contagion among members of their families. We employ two nurses, who inspect their homes and point out errors in their method of living. We have an educational committee that provides lectures in

this Penny day campaign and the details of it all will be announced later. Hardly a person in San Francisco but has lost some near and dear, either relative or friend, through the terrible disease of tuberculosis. Hardly a person in San Francisco but will be able to give at least one penny toward the fight not only to cure, but to prevent it. From the president of the association comes the following exposition of the aims and uses of the organization:

schools and churches and other public places, so as to teach people how to prevent tuberculosis. That is so much easier than to cure. We have a legislative committee that co-operates with our state legislature, our board of supervisors and our board of health to obtain sanitary laws and their proper enforcement. It may be a mere coincidence, but since the organization of this association it is a fact that the mortality in San Francisco from tuberculosis has been decreased nearly a half.

WORK IS INDORSERD

From the president of the United States down, the work of this and similar associations is vouchsafed for and receives the stamp of their approval.

All this work requires money. And there should be money to do relief work among those so stricken that they can not work and to provide day and night camps and places where light work can be done in the open air, for the patient must, above all, have plenty of good air and nourishing food, and so the call is doing the noblest kind of work in helping us gather in the pennies for the Christmas seals.

EX-WIFE SUED TO REGAIN PROPERTY

Woman's Second Marriage Is Termed Illegal and Annulment Now Is Sought

Scott declares that Mrs. C. C. Pitkin, who was formerly Mrs. C. C. Pitkin, obtained a divorce from him in Sacramento that was illegal, and that she used this illegal decree to induce him to deed over to her property in San Francisco and Sacramento worth several thousand dollars. He declares that the deed was obtained through fraud, that there was no divorce, and that therefore her marriage to Pitkin should be automatically annulled. He asks the court to set aside the deed and give him half of the property.
