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DUCK DINNER FOR 4,000 IDLE MEN

City Provides Christmas for Unemployed: Will Feed Men Until Monday

Duck dinners are being fed to the city's unemployed today. The army of homeless, idle men, who marched upon the city hall yesterday and made a successful plea to Mayor Rolph and the supervisors for aid are receiving shelter and Christmas food in abundance. In fact, the amount of provisions on hand is greater than the demand.

At the San Francisco Co-operative Bureau of Employment, 335 Main street, the official relief headquarters, tables are set for 4,000 men for the big holiday dinner.

Mayor Rolph announced this morning that the program adopted yesterday will be carried out in its entirety.

FOOD AND SHELTER PROVIDED

"All who apply will be given food and shelter," said Rolph. "The appropriation made by the supervisors will cover all demands, and persons authorized to give aid will be reimbursed by the city. Food will be supplied until Sunday, and on Monday the plan to provide employment will be put into effect. Every man can have a roof over his head and enough to eat."

A detachment of 25 men from the unemployed army were fed at 335 Main street last night, in addition to the 216 regularly taken care of. Another large force was given breakfast this morning. Ten cooks were busy since 3 o'clock this morning preparing the Christmas dinner.

An idea of the menu may be gathered from the provisions which have been purchased for the occasion. There are 200 pounds of hamburger steak, 200 pounds of mutton steak, 200 pounds of beef, 600 pounds of salmon, donated by the fish and game commission, and 450 ducks. There are also 12 sacks of potatoes, 500 loaves of bread and enough coffee, in the words of the chief cook, to float a battleship.

RELIEF HOME FEEDS MANY

At the relief home, Superintendent Walkenberg also provided food for several hundred unemployed. The men were housed during the night at the Marrye building, Marshall square, and the unemployed quarters adjoining the hall of justice. The Green Street Congregational church was opened to the homeless men last night as was the basement of the Trinity church, Twenty-sixth and Mission streets. Rev. George Jackson of the church federation is busy today arranging for the opening of other churches for the homeless men tonight.

In accordance with the program adopted by the supervisors yesterday, the unemployed will register for work at 335 Main street this afternoon. The registration will be in the hands of Superintendent Harry Bokart of the institution, the San Francisco Labor council and the special committee appointed by the supervisors. Emergency work will be supplied 200 men daily in felling trees, leveling ground and clearing the grounds of the relief home farm. Single men will be given two days' work a week at the rate of 32 for six hours' work and married men will get three days' work at the same rate. Each will also be supplied with a hot meal at the relief home.

UNEMPLOYED BAND CONTINUES MARCH

FRESNO, Dec. 25.—At 10 o'clock this morning the organized band of 175 unemployed men who have been here for the last three days continued its march south. The men will not go directly to Bakerville, however, but will first travel east to Sanger, 12 miles distant, where they will stay tonight. A committee named at a mass meeting Tuesday secured sufficient rations to guarantee the men dinner and supper today. From Sanger the unemployed will march to Porterville, stopping at other small towns en route. It probably will be three weeks before they reach Bakerville. There has been no petty thievery.

Forged Names Found On Recall Petition

The recall movement against State Senator Edwin E. Grant is apparently doomed to failure. Registrar Zeman's reports 194 forged names on the petition, in addition to 780 names of persons not registered and 258 duplications, making a total of 1,232 invalid signatures. This leaves but 1,427 names that can be accepted. The number required to call the election is 2,334.

Piedmont Society Bud Ideal American Girl

Miss Lorna Williamson of Piedmont is one of the ideal American girls, according to the vote of a committee of seven artists who have been acting for a New York publication. She is a society bud and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Williamson, 211 Hillside avenue. The decision was reached yesterday.

Glacier Plays Prank; Gives Canada Harbor, Then Takes It Back

British Port on Alaskan Coast Is Switched Over to United States by Action of Ice Deposit

PORTLAND, Dec. 25.—The Grand Pacific glacier in Alaska at the head of Glacier bay had been "playing Indian" with Canada by giving her a harbor on the Alaskan coast and then taking it back again, according to Prof. Lawrence Martin of the University of Wisconsin, who returned after making a survey of the glaciers in that region for the National Geographic society.

Glacier bay, wholly within American territory when the Canadian boundary treaty was made, extended into Canadian territory during the summer of 1912 by the recession of the Grand Pacific glacier, thereby giving Canada harbor facilities.

A sudden and rapid advance of the glacier since that time has pushed the head of the bay back 4,000 feet into American territory again, Professor Martin reports.

400,000 Pounds Mail Daily in Oakland

The record in the Oakland post-office for business during the past two weeks of the Christmas rush has averaged nearly 400,000 pounds of mail daily, according to Postmaster Paul Schaefer. One hundred and fifty thousand packages passed through the office yesterday and the day before. Since 2 o'clock Tuesday morning 220,000 Christmas cards and letters have been handled. In Alameda 1,000,000 pieces of mail were handled by the office since the beginning of the Christmas season. Five wagons have been engaged and will be kept busy until late today delivering mail to homes in the Encinal city.

British Financier Predicts Good Times

Normal conditions, and not depression, reign in the business and financial world at present, according to Sir Robert Balfour of London, senior member of the firm of Balfour, Williamson & Co., commission merchants of New York and London, who arrived in the city yesterday to spend several weeks looking after his California interests.

The financier takes the stand that during the last several years there has been abnormal activity in this country and in England, and that conditions are now just returning to the normal. He does not think that hard times are to be feared.

25,000 Made Glad by Call Christmas Trees

Five thousand San Francisco homes are happy today, especially happy, and about 25,000 children are dancing with joy as the result of the sale of the 4,000 Christmas trees bought by the Call and Post. These trees were put within the reach of all at a price covering only the cost of bringing them to San Francisco and getting them to the buyers in time for the festivities today. Fifty cents apiece they went for. It was the biggest bargain and the biggest sale of the kind yet recorded.

Gifts Are Exchanged By County Officials

Christmas gifts were exchanged last evening between Alameda county officials and between subordinates and their chiefs. F. W. Haines, superintendent of the recorder's office, received a set of diamond and ruby cuff links from his deputies. District Attorney W. H. L. Hynes received a desk set from the members of his staff, while all the other officials gave and received little tokens of the season.

Thanks for Raise Say Carmen to Officials

A letter signed by more than 150 employees of the Sutter street lines has been received by President Jesse W. Lilienthal and Vice President and General Manager Charles W. Black of the United Railroads, thanking them for securing an increase in pay for the street carmen and for their interest in obtaining for the employees insurance.

Thieves Help Selves to Shop's Christmas Gifts

Burglars early today entered the Irish crocheting lace house, 482 Sutter street, and helped themselves to Christmas presents. The loot consisted of 200 lace collars, valued at \$400, and 100 yards of Irish lace, worth \$100.

'HETCH HETCHY IN FIVE YEARS'—LONG

If the work is rushed San Francisco can have Hetch Hetchy water in five years, according to City Attorney Long in an address at the weekly luncheon of the California League for Home Rule in Taxation. "The outside limit is 10 years, but if forced the project can be completed in five," said Long. "The city will begin its development work in May on the Tuolumne river below the Hetch Hetchy dam site. Construction of roads and power houses will be the first work."

"One of the first things to be considered is the acquisition of the Spring Valley properties. Within a few days the condemnation suit will be filed."

SACRAMENTO RIVER RISING
SACRAMENTO, Dec. 25.—The Sacramento river is rising rapidly and is 12½ feet deep, a greater volume of water than has been recorded for two years.

EXPLORERS ARE HAILED WIRELESS TAKES "NOTE"

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—Through the Arctic regions last night, unless the aurora borealis interfered, a wireless message from the sponsors of the Crocker land expedition sped to its leader, Donald B. MacMillan, and his companion at Etah, Greenland, 1,600 miles away. It was a Christmas message from the American Museum of Natural History, the American Geographical society and the University of Illinois, and was signed by Dr. Edmund O. Hevey of the museum, director of the expedition. The message reads:

Heartiest greetings and best wishes from museum, geographical society and University of Illinois, and from family and personal friends of yourself and all your party. We are all well, and

are confident of your success, in spite of all difficulties, though no word from you has come through yet.

The message was forwarded through the Canadian government channels. It was looked on as a good guess that it would reach its destination, and though the wireless outfit of the party is expected to have caught it, it is not powerful enough to send an answer, which is tantalizing to those who want to know about the expedition.

NO CHEER FOR CHARLTON

MARSHALL AGAINST WILSON'S POLICY

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 25.—Vice President Marshall in an interview takes issue with President Wilson on the need of further trust legislation. The president in his recent annual message declared the clearing up of the doubtful ground around the Sherman law to be the next big duty of congress, and promised a special message on the subject.

After expressing joy over the enactment of the tariff and currency bills, Mr. Marshall said:

"My personal opinion is that this is all the democratic party ought to undertake now. Let's wait and see how these two new laws work out. I believe sincerely they will prove the solution of the country's problems. There is no need for anti-trust legislation at this time. The trusts are now coming in and eating out of the hand of the attorney general."


