LONDON'S IMMENSITY.

An Appalling Thought Founded on the Continual Growth of the Great City.

The fact that the London of the future will probably be less equal than the London of the past does not, says The London Spectator, affect the appallingness of the thought that there are plenty of men and women alive to-day who may live to see 17,500,000 of people gathered together on an area which of itself will not produce enough food to keep a hundredth part of them alive for two days.

Think what the figures mean. We shall have the whole population of Spain gathered within a seven-mile radius from Charing Cross. Spain, by the census of 1887, had a population of 17,500,000. In the year 1851 the population of England and Wales was not very much over 17,500,000. Future London, therefore, will contain as many people as England contained in the year of the great exhibition. Again, the population of England and Wales in 1801 was only 8,892,536, and therefore, future London will have nearly double the population which England had when we were fighting Napoleon.

THE production of whisky in Kentucky in 1880 was 15,011,379 gallons. In 1891, 31,373,043 gallons. In the United States in 1880 the production was 90,355,270 gallons; in 1891, 115,962,389 gallons, consuming about 29,000,000 bushels of corn.

WHISKY is the most extensive product of the state of Kentucky. There has been for three years past about 31,000,000 gallons produced annually. A well-informed distiller says that it will reach 60,000,000 gallons per year within five years.

THE venerable widow of James M. Buchanan, for many years Professor of Mathematics at Center College, Danville, died of old age near Holly Springs, Miss. She was the daughter of Major Isaac Greathouse, one of the earliest settlers of Shelby county. Her husband died at a very advanced age in 1875.

THURSDAY the Republican Executive Committee of North Carolina will decide whether there shall be three or only two tickets run in that state this fall. The state Republican organ, which favored the nomination of a full party ticket, now appears to lean to the other policy, and the probabilities are that an alliance between the Republicans and Third party will be consummated. It is a question whether this fusion will promote or heal the breach in the Democratic party, and increase the prospect of wresting the state from it.

A. J. FORD, of Richmond, Va., has filed suit of ejectment against his son, B. W. Ford, of Castleton Stock Farm, near Lexington. Young Ford has been breeding trotters for several years and has made a great success at the business. He is a bachelor of about 30 and is highly esteemed, besides he is well known to breeders throughout the country. The plaintiff, A. J. Ford, is the proprietor of Ford's Hotel in Richmond, and various other properties, the aggregate value of which was recently appraised, it is stated, at nearly \$600,000. It seems that unhappiness has prevailed for some years past in the Ford household. Colonel Ford and his wife have not spoken to each other for years, the result of a business disagreement.

ONCE in eight years all the locks on U. S. mail bags must be changed, if not oftener. This is because after awhile a good many lost keys get around and it is not safe to have them so distributed. Just now the equipment division of the Postoffice Department is making over one-fourth of a million old locks, merely for the purpose of rendering them different. They were very good in their day and are still so in all other respects. At first it was suggested that all these locks should be thrown away. The junkmen were asked how much they would give for them and they said 20 cents a 100 pounds. This did not seem large, inasmuch as the Postoffice had originally paid 57 cents apiece for the locks. Therefore it was concluded to make them over again and this is being done now at a cost of 62 cents per lock.

THE celebrated John T. Wilson will case was settled in the Adams County Court of Common Pleas. The executor of the estate of the late John T. Wilson applied to the court for a construction of two paragraphs in the will, one giving one-half of the residue of his estate, amounting to \$100,000, to the "worthy poor" of the county, and who were the proper custodians of the money left the Children's Home. After notice had been served upon the heirs, they put in a petition or answer claiming that the item giving the money to the "worthy poor" was indefinite, and that the money should be paid to the legal heirs of Mr. Wilson. Judge Davis gave his decision Saturday. He decided that Captain Wilson intended to leave the money to those who by disease or accident had been rendered unable to support themselves. The Commissioners, he said, were the legal custodians of the Home. The heirs gave notice of appeal.

Shall of a Swedish Queen. A Swedish Queen's grave was reopened at Upsala in the presence of the Prince regent, the Archbishop and many Professors. The grave, which dates from 1584, is situated in a side aisle of the Cathedral of Upsala, in a vault beneath the pavement; on the ceiling are painted the royal arms. On the immense stone over the grave are engraved in Latin the words: "Catherine, Queen of Sweden, died September 16th, 1583; daughter of Sigmand, King of Poland, and wife of Johann III., King of Sweden. She was buried on the 16th of February, 1584." On removing this stone a copper coffin was found and opened. Within was a wooden coffin somewhat decayed, and lined with velvet in rags. Beneath a leather cover lay the corpse of the Queen clothed in velvet, the feet in stuffed shoes. Amid the folds of the velvet lay an extremely small skull.

At a meeting of the grain merchants and millers of Maysville, held on June 24th, 1892, the subject of cleaning wheat by farmers was introduced and fully discussed, and the following preamble and resolution was adopted: That whereas, in former years, owing to the superior quality and cleanliness of Mason county wheat, it enjoyed a reputation second to no other section of the country and was much sought after, but in recent years, owing to the imperfect cleaning of wheat by threshers, it has suffered very materially in grading in the general markets in comparison with wheat from other states, resulting in no inconsiderable loss to the farmers, and many of the former large wheat customers who bought wheat here have in consequence been directed to other markets; therefore, be it Resolved, That the grain dealers and millers of this city feel that it is incumbent upon them to make it known to the farmers that they must insist upon them having their wheat well cleaned and screened by threshers, otherwise prices will be made accordingly. They desire to state, for the benefit of the farmers, that wheat to grade No. 2 must weigh at least 55 pounds to the bushel, thoroughly clean and dry, free from smut and other impurities; and that wheat to grade No. 3 must weigh at least 56 pounds to the bushel, and be dry and reasonably clean, and may have an occasional smut ball, but free from stain. Wheat not up to the above grades will be classed as rejected.
