FLEMINGSBURG.

A large and enthusiastic Blue and Gray Reunion began in Hillroy's woods near Grange City in this county last Thursday and lasted until Saturday evening. There was a parade of the veterans of both the C. S. A. and U. S. A. armies. There has been an average attendance of about 1,000 people daily. Hon. John P. McCartney of this city delivered a stirring patriotic address Friday afternoon, and Saturday afternoon Chief Justice of Kentucky, Hon. W. H. Holt, delivered a strong, able, dignified address. Judge Holt is much stronger than his party in this county, as nearly all the Prohibitionists and Third party people are for him.

JOHN WALSH, real estate agent, sold a house and lot on Saturday to A. Alton for \$550. The property belonged to W. H. Rider.

During the past seven days there were 179 business failures throughout the United States and Canada, as against 176 the week before and 214 the corresponding week last year.

DR. FRISON of Philadelphia who has been temporarily filling the pulpit of the late Mr. Spurgeon in the Metropolitan Tabernacle, London, has been decided upon as his permanent successor.

The Epworth League of the Third Street M. E. Church will give a social at the residence of Miss May Lane next Tuesday evening. Refreshments will be served. All young people are cordially invited.

EDWARD W. JONES, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of Danville, died after a lingering illness at the age of 87 years. He was the father of Capt. Joseph M. Jones, Clerk of the Circuit Court, and of the late Lawrence Jones, for many years Prosecuting Attorney.

A COMBINE has been formed between the breweries of Chicago by which they are to contribute jointly the sum of \$6,000,000 for the purchase of saloons throughout the city. The best paying establishments are to be purchased and run in the interest of the trust.

Mrs. MARGARET EITEL was granted a license on Saturday to retail malt liquors at the old Crawford stand on the Germantown pike, by acting County Judge Grant. There was a remonstrance against such license, but after having the evidence of both sides it was decided that the license be granted.

The Frankfort Capital says a member of the House who kept an accurate account of his expenses during the late session says that they averaged \$3.95 per week. The session held for exactly thirty-three weeks. His expenses were therefore \$139.35. He drew, as per diem, \$1.15; for stationery, \$3, and for mileage, let us say, \$30, a total of \$1,305. From this deduct \$139.35 for expenses, and it is found that this thirty representative took home with him \$1,174.65. Whatever the session may have proven to the state, this gentleman will probably consider it a very profitable one to himself.

A stock company is being formed with a capital of \$60,000, all paid up, for the purpose of erecting a mammoth sale stable in the West End of Lexington. The horsemen think this move is rendered necessary by the action of the Tattersalls-Bradfield Company in refusing to allow any sales to be held at their exchange adjoining the Fair Grounds save those conducted by the company. The new enterprise intends to get as many breeders interested as possible, and the idea is to hold semi-annual breeders' sales of trotting stock. One prominent breeder, who has taken stock in the company, has already announced that he intends to train no more horses, but will sell his trotting-bred youngsters as yearlings, the same as breeders of thoroughbreds do.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
—ADOPTED BY—
THE PUBLIC LEDGER CO.
OF MAYSVILLE, KY.

ART. I. Be it known that William H. Cox, Thomas A. Davis, W. H. Wadsworth, Jr., Samuel T. Hickman, Allen A. Edmonds, George L. Cox and Allen A. Edmonds, have this day associated themselves together and become incorporated under and by virtue of Chapter 56 of the General Statutes of the State of Kentucky as The Public Ledger Company and by that name shall sue and be sued, contract and be contracted with, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to alter same at pleasure.

ART. 2. The capital stock of said Corporation shall be \$5,000, divided into shares of \$10 each, and the same shall be transferable by written assignment on the certificate, and when transferred the certificate for same shall be surrendered to the Company and canceled, and new ones issued in lieu thereof.

ART. 3. This Corporation is organized for the purpose of publishing a newspaper in the city of Maysville, and distributing the same throughout the state of Kentucky, and for the carrying on of a general newspaper business in said city and state.

ART. 4. The principal place of business of said Corporation shall be at Maysville, Ky. The capital stock of said Corporation may be increased at a meeting of the stockholders (those holding a majority of the stock assenting thereto) to any sum not exceeding \$10,000. This increase shall be made by the issue of 300 shares of its stock is subscribed. Stock may be paid for in money or equivalent at an agreed contract price, and any stock not subscribed for may be taken from time to time, as the Directors may direct and authorize, and the certificates of stock shall be signed by the President and Secretary, and the corporation shall be added to same.

ART. 5. The Corporation shall be managed by a Board of five persons who shall be elected annually at the Company's office in Maysville, Ky. on the 1st Monday in March of each year. If, for any reason, there should not be an election held at the time fixed, the Directors may elect as many persons until their successors are elected and qualified.

ART. 6. The Directors shall choose from their number a President and Vice-President, and from said number of the Company a Secretary and Treasurer, or, if they see fit, they may combine these two offices into one. They shall elect an Editor, and may elect an assistant to the Editor, both of whose duties and tenure of office they may fix and prescribe by by-laws of the Company, which by-laws a majority of the Directors may adopt for the management of the Company's affairs.

ART. 7. The Company shall not incur an indebtedness exceeding, in the aggregate, at any one time, a sum equal to one-half of the capital stock paid in.

ART. 8. The private property of the stockholders of this Company shall be exempt from all debts or liabilities of the Corporation.

ART. 9. The Corporation shall begin when it shall have organized, as provided for herein, and shall continue as long as may be necessary, according to law.
