

STEAMBOAT MATTERS.

WHAT IS GOING ON ALONG THE BEAUTIFUL OHIO RIVER.
Driftwood Gathered on Shore and Stream by The Ledger's Weather-Beaten Old Tar and Piled Up Ready For Use.



Packets on the lower Ohio have been badly detained by fog. Many of the smaller towns along the Ohio are entirely out of coal. The river coal miners at Pittsburgh continue to hold out, refusing to go to work at the reduction.

The *St. Lawrence* now makes daily trips in the Cincinnati and Maysville trade except Sundays.

During the past week the output of coal from the pools along the Monongahela river was 249,000 bushels.

Towboat movements continue brisk owing to the efforts being made to get as many empty barges as far up the river as possible.

It is said that one of the big packet companies at Cincinnati will run a boat in the Kanawha river trade in opposition to the Bay Line.

The recent sinking of the little steamer *Edna* with the Government officials aboard, at Troy, Ind., occurred while she lay moored at the bank, and while everyone aboard lay sound asleep. When she was raised not a break or leak of any kind could be found. The only possible explanation of the occurrence is found in supposing that she sunk from her own siphon, something having brought the mouth of the pipe below the surface of the water. Pilot Royal Hart was the first to discover the danger. He woke with a sensation that the boat was dropping out from under him, and leaping out of the bed, landed in three feet of water. He at once gave the alarm, and all had barely time to get to the bank when she disappeared in fifteen feet of water.

After the C. and O. pay car passed up the road last week, seven of the thirteen section hands at Springdale got gloriously drunk. They had lots of fun but lost their job.


Charles Davis, Express Messenger on the Maysville Division of the L. and N., has been transferred to the main line until after Thanksgiving.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

—ADOPTED BY—
THE PUBLIC LEDGER CO.
OF MAYSVILLE, KY.

ART. 1. Be it known that William H. Cox, Thomas A. Davis, W. H. Wadsworth, Jr., Samuel T. Hickman, A. M. J. Cochran, M. C. Russell, George L. Cox and Allen A. Edwards have this day associated themselves together and become incorporated under and by virtue of Chapter 56 of the General Statutes of the State of Kentucky to start and carry on a company and by that name shall sue and be sued, contract and be contracted with, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to alter same in whole or in part.

ART. 2. The capital stock of said Corporation shall be \$5,000, divided into shares of \$10 each, and the same shall be transferred by written assignment on the certificate, and when transferred the certificate for same shall be surrendered to the Company and cancelled, and new ones issued in lieu thereof.

ART. 3. This Corporation is organized for the purpose of publishing a newspaper in the city of Maysville, and distributing the same throughout the state of Kentucky, and for the carrying on of a general newspaper business in said city and state.

ART. 4. The principal place of business of said Corporation shall be at Maysville, Ky. The capital stock of said Corporation may be increased at a meeting of the stockholders (those holding a majority of the stock and assenting thereto) to any sum not exceeding \$10,000. This Corporation may exceed when 250 shares of its stock is subscribed. Stock may be paid for in money or property at an agreed contract price, and any stock not subscribed for may be sold from time to time, or the Directors may direct and authorize, and the certificates of stock shall be signed by the President and Secretary, and the corporate seal shall be affixed to same.

ART. 5. The Corporation shall be managed by a Directory of five persons who shall be elected annually at the Company's office in Maysville, Ky., on the last Monday in March of each year. If for any reason there shall not be an election held at the time fixed, the Directors in office shall continue as such until their successors are elected and qualified.

ART. 6. The Directors shall choose from their number a President and Vice-President, and from said number or the stockholders a Secretary and Treasurer, or if they see fit they may combine these two offices into one. They shall elect an Editor, and may elect an assistant to the Editor, both of whose duties and tenure of office they may fix and prescribe by by-laws of the Company, which by-laws a majority of the Directors may adopt for the management of the Company's affairs.

ART. 7. The Company shall not incur an indebtedness exceeding, in the aggregate, at any one time, a sum equal to one-half of the capital stock paid in.

ART. 8. The private property of the stockholders of this Company shall be exempt from all debts or liabilities of the Corporation.

ART. 9. The Corporation shall begin when it shall have organized, as provided for herein, and shall continue as long as may be necessary, according to law.
