AN ORDINANCE
To Prohibit Riding Bicycles on the Sidewalks of the City.
Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Maysville, That it shall be unlawful, and is now so declared unlawful, for any person or persons to ride upon a bicycle upon any of the sidewalks of the city, and any person or persons so offending shall, upon conviction before the Police Judge of the said city, be fined in the sum of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25.
Be it further ordained, That this ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage.
