SHAMEFUL DISORDER.

Manager Heffner is providing the theater going public with an unusually fine list of attractions, and seems to have taken all the means necessary, in an ordinarily well behaved community, for maintaining order in the place of amusement under his charge. Therefore, what follows is not meant as a criticism of Mr. Heffner or the Council Committee, under whose supervision he manages the city's house of amusement. We simply want to warn the crowd of ignorant buffoons, asses, puppies and indecent ruffians who have ruined each performance at the Opera-house for several weeks past, that they are in danger. Some night soon, unless relief comes from elsewhere, a half dozen men are going to rise together, march to the rear of the house and balcony and make bruised mince out of a lot of creatures who certainly never had mothers or fathers to teach them consideration for the comfort, pleasures or rights of others. A mob of men to have cleared the house of the crowd that turned a pleasurable performance into an irritating trial of patience last Saturday night would have been justifiable. Next time there is a performance at the Opera-house Chief Tobin should have every member of the police force present in citizen's dress with instructions to arrest every man, woman and child guilty of disorder, and with instructions to club the boys if they can find an excuse to do so. The Capital can furnish the Chief with the names of a dozen private citizens who would like to be sworn in as special police if the latter instructions are given.

The Capital's language is pretty plain, and part of it will apply to the Maysville Opera-house just as well as it could apply to the Frankfort establishment. The disorder in the balcony and gallery is the cause of many persons staying away from the house.
