LAST OF THE FAMILY.

William Best Shot and Instantly Killed by Shelby Nunn. LANCASTER, Ky., July 9.—William Best, the last member of the Best family, was shot and instantly killed by Shelby Nunn at 12:30 o'clock near his home at Paint Lick, about twelve miles from here.

FAMOUS DETECTIVE MISSING. LEXINGTON, Ky., July 9.—The famous mountain detective, George W. Drake, who has convicted more moonshiners and murderers than any official in eastern Kentucky, is mysteriously missing.

BURIED AT PINEVILLE. PINEVILLE, Ky., July 9.—The dead bodies of Gus Loeb and his wife, who were murdered in Harlan county about two weeks ago, were brought here and buried. The murder of the old people for their money was one of the worst crimes ever committed in this part of the country.

HE WAS MURDERED. MILTON, Ky., July 9.—Phillip Messenger, aged 56, was found dead in bed with three bullet holes in his body. The house has been ransacked, but this is believed to have been a blind to make people believe robbers murdered him.

GOV. BROWN NOT ILL. FRANKFORT, Ky., July 9.—The many reports sent out to the effect that Gov. Brown was seriously ill are all utterly without foundation. The executive is enjoying the best of health, and has not been sick one day in two years.

ANOTHER SUDDEN DEATH. OWENSBORO, Ky., July 9.—Hon. John G. Norton, one of the most prominent citizens of Owensboro, fell dead of heart disease Monday morning. Three similar sudden deaths have occurred in this city within the past 24 hours.
