All the Tollgates Removed From the Lewis and Mason Turnpike.

Pursuant to order of the Fiscal Court, the Turnpike Commissioners yesterday paid the owners of the Lewis and Mason Turnpike Company the sum of \$5,500 for that part of the road lying in Mason county.

Lewis county had already freed her end of the pike.

The tollgates are now removed from this important road, and it may be traveled free from "end to end."

Yesterday was the first day on which the deal could be consummated, as the City Council only met the night before to arrange for the city's interest in the road.
