COUNTY CONVENTION!

The Republicans of Mason Yesterday Choose a Ticket.

NOW LET'S ELECT THEM ALL!



The Republicans of Mason county—or at least as many of them as could be rammed, crammed and jammed into the Courthouse—met yesterday to nominate a county ticket.

The meeting was called to order at 2 o'clock by Chairman Mathews, when Sam T. Hickman was made Chairman of the Convention, with A. F. Curran Secretary.

On motion of W. H. Davis the Chair appointed N. Cooper, John T. Short, R. P. Hopper, Carey Devore and R. R. Maltby a Committee on Credentials, which reported that everything was in proper form.

Nominations being in order, Elder T. P. Deyman named John Y. Rice of Murphysville for Representative, and his nomination was made unanimous.

Judge M. C. Hutchins was renominated for County Judge.

William Key and Scott Stevenson were named for Sheriff, and Mr. Key was nominated.

H. C. Sharp was nominated unanimously for Circuit Clerk.

William D. Cochran was unanimously renominated for County Clerk.

George W. Adair and George H. Martin were named for County Attorney and Adair was nominated.

Miss Mary P. Chambers and W. T. Berry were named for County Superintendent, and Mr. Berry was nominated.

John Johnson was unanimously renominated for Jailor.

For Assessor, Messrs. R. G. Bullock, C. T. Biggers and Elzie Payton were named, and Mr. Bullock was nominated.

O. E. Collins was nominated for Coroner by acclamation.

NEWSY NOTES FROM NATURE'S GREAT HIGHWAY.

The Ohio is falling all along the line. The Stanley went to Pomeroy last night.

The Sherley will pass up for Pomeroy tonight.

The Bonanza will pass down tonight from Pomeroy.

The Virginia with a big trip and way behind time passed to Cincinnati last night. This palace returns tonight for Pittsburgh.

Mr. Garrett Keras, one of the Clerks of the Courrier, is the proud possessor of a handsome gold watch and chain. It was presented to him by his mother, Mrs. Julia Keras of Augusta, on her son's 18th birthday.

It is about settled that Mr. James Gardner of Vanceburg will be Clerk of the new steamer Queen City. The second and third clerks of the Hudson will go on the Queen City, as will Pilots Tony Mel-dahl and Phil. Anshutz. The remainder of the crew has not yet been determined upon.

The most tremendous flood that has ever been known in the Mississippi river is now running out to sea. The crest of its terrible wave, which was more than two feet higher than any ever recorded, has passed out to the Gulf of Mexico, and there is a slow but steady fall of the water all along the line. Business is being rapidly revived at New Orleans and planters have resumed operations.

The Scientific American recently gave a description of a new torpedo boat, the Turbinia, which is the fastest vessel ever built. Her engines are of entirely new pattern, called rotary impact, and the experiments already tried have proved a great triumph in marine engineering. The vessel is 100 feet long and 9-foot beam, and was built at Newcastle, England. The Turbinia has realized a speed of 32½ knots an hour, surpassing by a knot and a half the previous world's record. When it is recalled that 32½ knots are equivalent to about 37½ miles, the feat seems even more wonderful.

The owners of the towboat Dauntless, recently wrecked at Pittsburgh, and the insurance people are likely to have a lawsuit about the boat. James Jones & Sons, the owners of the boat, abandoned the Dauntless to the insurance company, and demanded the full amount of insurance, \$6,000. The insurance company chose to repair the boat instead of paying the money, and, accordingly, went to work, raised the boat, put her on the docks and fully repaired her, at a total cost of \$4,000. Messrs. Jones now refuse to take the boat, as a rule of insurance requires them to pay about 50 per cent. of the cost of repairs where the loss is not total. The United States Steamboat Inspectors have examined the Dauntless and pronounce her in good condition. The outcome of the controversy will be watched with much interest.
