### ART EXHIBIT.

Very Creditable Showing of the Work of the Public Schools.

As the future welfare of our city depends largely on the instruction given in our Public Schools, our citizens should ever feel a keen interest in the character of work turned out by the pupils.

Only a few years since drawing was added to the course of city schools, and that teacher and pupil alike have worked diligently to make this study a profitable and interesting one was clearly manifested in the very creditable art exhibition at the High School Friday and Saturday afternoons of last week.

Miss Julia M. Stone is the teacher of drawing in all the schools of the city, and the splendid showing of the year's work attested her true worth as a teacher and a master of the art.

The exhibit of clay models of the primary departments of the several districts attracted much attention, and gave evidence of the careful training the children had received. The models of the older pupils, though difficult, were cleverly executed, and would compare favorably with that done on a larger scale in other cities.

In paper-cutting and drawing the exhibit was excellent, and many compliments were heard from those who inspected the work.

The Western Drawing Teachers' Association invited Maysville, the only city so honored in Kentucky, to send specimens of the work of its schools to the exhibit at St. Louis, and many of the best pieces of models and drawing have been sent there.

It will be noticed that the Sixth Ward is given separately from the five older wards, for the reason that under the terms of incorporation the property in that ward is not assessed for the old railroad debts.

Applying the rule, five inhabitants to each voter, this gives Maysville a population of 7,820, not counting residents of Plugtown, Clifton, Culbertson and Hordville, which, if added, would easily swell the total to over 10,000.
