

The Ohio river below Davis Island Dam has reached a stage of 7 feet, and it will probably rise another foot.

Captain Lewis A. Reno, who was known from one end of the Ohio to the other as "Doc," died Thursday night, aged 68 years. Captain Reno belonged to the Reno family of pilots. During the war he piloted United States soldiers up the Tennessee river. He was pilot of the first Dick Fulton. He is survived by a widow and four children. His brothers are Captains John, William and Alfred Reno, Jr. Captain Reno was a nephew of Captain Alfred Reno, Sr., the oldest living pilot about Pittsburgh.

Taking the towboat business into consideration, the river business is larger than it ever was, and the passenger and freight have also improved largely within the past few years. As the river is none too good there at any time, this boat load of stone in the channel is not likely to improve matters, and the steamboat men are determined to find out who the parties are who are thus willfully obstructing the river, and bring the matter before the proper authorities.
