**BANKRUPTCY LAW.**

Something About Voluntary and Involuntary Bankruptcy—Difference Between Them.

Petitions for voluntary bankruptcy may be filed now under the new law, which went into effect July 1st, for involuntary bankruptcy, not before November 1st.

By a "voluntary" bankrupt the law means one who files his own petition without waiting for his creditors to raise callous spots camping on his neck.

A voluntary bankrupt files with his petition a schedule of his debts and his property.

If the Court decides the petitioner a bankrupt a meeting of the creditors is called.

Here the bankrupt may speak freely. His explanation may never be used against him in criminal proceedings.

The creditors select a trustee. He winds up the business and pays dividends.

After one month the bankrupt may apply for a discharge. Notice must be given to creditors. If the bankrupt has satisfied all requirements he is entitled to release.

In involuntary bankruptcy proceedings are begun by the creditor or creditors, who allege an "act of bankruptcy" and ask a decree.

Transferring property to defraud creditors would be an act of bankruptcy, or transferring property while insolvent to certain creditors with intent to give them an advantage over other creditors.

The bankrupt is entitled to trial by jury upon questions of fact raised in the petition.

After a decree of bankruptcy is given the proceeding is as in involuntary bankruptcy.

In either class of bankruptcy the Judge may name a referee to consider either the entire matter or certain questions to be considered and reported upon.

If the creditors want the bankrupt to continue in business he may offer terms which may be accepted in writing by a majority of the creditors. The Judge may hear an application to confirm the terms and grant it if he deems the arrangement fair to the creditors, and if the bankrupt has done nothing contrary to law.

After one month the bankrupt is entitled to a discharge unless he has committed an offense punishable by imprisonment under the act, or destroyed his books with fraudulent intent, or for similar reasons failed to keep books.

The Latest News From All Parts of the Commonwealth.

**Temperance Workers in Louisville.**  
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 1.—Temperance workers are swarming into the city from all quarters of the state Friday for the 18th annual convention of the state W. C. T. U., which will be inaugurated Friday evening with a great rally in the Warren Memorial church. The sessions will continue until Wednesday of next week and will be participated in by many leaders of the temperance movement from this and other states.

**Troops Will Not Be Needed.**  
FRANKFORT, Ky., Oct. 1.—The governor has been informed by Circuit Judge Brown, of the Clay county district, that soldier protection will not be needed at the trial of members of the Baker faction there next month. To satisfy himself further the governor has written to several others, including the sheriff of the county. The Bakers still maintain that they will be mobbed if not protected by troops.

**More Tobacco Factories.**  
OWENSBORO, Ky., Oct. 1.—The tobacco crop in this vicinity was never better and Owensboro is making preparations to take care of it. Already there are 23 factories or warehouses with an average capacity of 1,000,000 pounds each, the American tobacco factory having a capacity of 3,000,000 pounds. The following are building new factories: Finzer Brothers, Charles Birk, John Hughes and J. Hunter Bell.

**Judgment Against the Bridge Company.**  
FRANKFORT, Ky., Oct. 1.—In the state fiscal court Friday Judge Cantrell rendered a judgment in favor of the state against the Central Bridge Co., of Newport, for franchise taxes of 1887 aggregating \$2,994.78, and for 1898 aggregating \$3,571.76. Judge Charles J. Helm, of Newport, represented the bridge company, and will take an appeal.

**Mormon Church Completed.**  
VANCEBURG, Ky., Oct. 1.—Elder John Woodmanson, of the Mormon church, has received an appointment placing him in charge of the various missions in this section, with headquarters at Vanceburg. The new church on Pleasant hill, three miles southwest of here, has been completed and will be formally dedicated Sunday.

**Mrs. Rodman Defeated.**  
FRANKFORT, Ky., Oct. 1.—S. B. Call, of Carlisle county, was named Friday for assistant sergeant-at-arms of the court of appeals. Mrs. Rodman, who was understood to be slated as successor to her late husband, was defeated by a combination of circumstances after she had at one time the race won.

**A Trusty Escapes.**  
FRANKFORT, Ky., Oct. 1.—Thomas Peck, a Negro convict sent to the penitentiary here from Jefferson county, for seven years, escaped from that institution. He is 30 years old and has been a trusty for two years. A description of him has been sent to the Covington and Newport police departments.

**Migration of Gamblers.**  
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 1.—The grand jury was at work Friday on a batch of indictments against proprietors and employes of gambling games. As a result, nearly every train out of the city has aboard some knights of the green cloth who are seeking more congenial climes and avoiding arrest.

**Buried in a \$550 Coffin.**  
HENDERSON, Ky., Oct. 1.—John F. Hughes, one of the wealthiest farmers in the county, died at his home near Corydon. He was 72 years of age and was buried at Corydon Thursday. He was buried in the highest priced coffin ever sold in this city. It cost \$550. He was always a plain man.

**Asks for Heavy Damages.**  
PADUCAH, Ky., Oct. 1.—Mrs. Aggie Grief, widow of J. H. Grief, who was shot and killed a short time since by Rufus Veal, filed suit for damages in the circuit court Friday. The slayer of the plaintiff's husband is made the defendant in the suit and \$50,000 damages is asked.

**Alleged Horsethieves.**  
SANDY HOOK, Ky., Oct. 1.—George Kozee, sheriff, and John Cottell, jailer, of Elliott county, arrested and brought two men here Friday from Lawrence county, charged with stealing two horses in Bath county. They caught them near the West Virginia line.

**Cleared of Murder Charge.**  
CAMPTON, Ky., Oct. 1.—The jury, after 30 hours' deliberation in the case against B. D. and R. S. Rose, charged with the murder of Jake Wireman, which occurred on the streets of Campton one year ago last June, brought in a verdict of acquittal.

**Offer for a Camp.**  
NEWPORT, Ky., Oct. 1.—The officers of the Queen City Jockey club Friday offered to Maj. Hutchins, of the quartermaster's department of the army, the use of the race track in this city for a camp. It is proposed to have about 5,000 troops here.

**Kicked by a Horse.**  
LANCASTER, Ky., Oct. 1.—While handling a young horse Friday William Embry, a prominent young man, was kicked and perhaps, fatally hurt.

**SHORT SPECIALS.**

Failures for the week have been 194 in the United States against 194 last year and 17 in Canada against 24 last year.

Gold amounting to more than \$1,500,000 arrived at New York on the steamer Auguste Victoria Friday from Hamburg.

At San Francisco, the torpedo boat destroyer Farragut is ready for her trial trip, on which she is expected to make 30 knots an hour.

Naval Constructor Hobson, with the Chapman barge Sharpe, is engaged in removing the guns from the sunken cruiser Almirante Oquendo.

James P. Collier, of Co. L, 22d Kansas infantry, died of typhoid fever at the University of Pennsylvania hospital, Philadelphia, Friday night.

The Italian government has issued formal invitations to the anti-anarchist congress, the date and place for holding which will be fixed hereafter.

It is rumored that Dreyfus has already been transferred from the Isle de Diabie to Cayenne, where he awaits a steamer to bring him to a French or an Algerian port.

At a special session of the Assize court Friday the trial of Lucchini, the Italian anarchist who assassinated the empress of Austria at Geneva on September 10, was fixed for November 3d.

Spain is seeking the consent of the United States to send Spanish troops from Manila to the Visayas islands to suppress the rebellion there, so as to avoid the necessity of dispatching troops from Spain.

One hundred and fifty men are now at work on the raised cruiser Maria Teresa. They have removed a lot of debris from the bilges and have got up steam in the starboard after boiler. The other boilers are all right.

An Italian laborer and a child were killed and three men seriously injured by the fall of a section of a combination derrick and aerial railway used in the construction of a sewer trench in Johnson avenue, Kearney, N. J., Friday.

The steamer San Antonio, which was loaded with Red Cross supplies for Havana, and then held at the New York port awaiting a settlement of the question of duties charged by the Spaniards on relief supplies, sailed Friday for Key West.

It is stated on good authority that a deal has been concluded by Delaware Indians for the purchase of 550,000 acres of land in Mexico, and that as soon as they secure settlement with the United States and the Cherokees they will remove there.

The state department gives confirmation to the report that it has given its assent through the American consul at Apia, Samoa, to the return to Samoa after an exile of ten years, of the former King Mataafa. It is assumed that this chief is to be made king to succeed the late King Malietoa, who died about a month ago.

Spain has apparently become convinced that there is something magnetic in the bugle used by the American army, for orders have been issued to discard the antiquated instruments used by the Dona's forces in the late war and to replace them with the trumpets of the regulation pattern adopted by the United States some years ago.
