UNCLE SAM AND GREATER AMERICA

At a meeting of the Republican Committee for the Third Railroad Commission District of Kentucky, held at Lexington on Saturday, February 18th, 1899, regularly called for the purpose of fixing the time and place for holding a Convention to name a Republican candidate for Commissioner of said District, the following resolutions were adopted and ordered published:

Resolved, That a Convention of Republicans be held at Richmond, Madison county, Ky., on Tuesday, the 24 day of May, 1899, to nominate a Republican candidate for Railroad Commissioner in the Third Kentucky Railroad Commission District, to be voted for at the regular November, 1899, election.

Resolved further, That delegates to said Convention be selected by Mass Conventions or primaries to be held in the respective counties comprising said District on Saturday, April 15th, 1899; that the basis of representation at said Railroad Commission Convention shall be one vote for each 100 votes cast for William McKinley at the election in November, 1896, and one vote for each fraction of 50 votes cast at said election for said candidate.

Upon the above basis the various counties are entitled to the following representation: Bath, 16; Bell, 19; Boone, 19; Bourbon, 20; Boyd, 21; Brecken, 12; Breathitt, 24; Carter, 8; Campbell, 10; Clark, 20; Clay, 11; Elliott, 6; Estill, 12; Fleming, 11; Floyd, 14; Grant, 14; Greenup, 15; Harlan, 12; Harrison, 17; Jackson, 15; Johnson, 18; Kenton, 12; Knott, 4; Knox, 20.

A POOR ORPHAN.

A Bust of Adm. Dewey Made From a Pike Stone by a Sixteen-Year-Old Boy of Fayette county, Ky.

LEXINGTON, Ky., March 11.—Ignatius Maloney, a 16-year-old orphan, who was adopted four years ago by Mrs. Susan Caden, of this county, from the asylum in Cumminsville, Cincinnati, conducted by the Sisters of Charity, is the subject of much comment here, and will very likely become the ward of some philanthropist with a view to the cultivation of his natural talents for sculpture. With a wooden mallet made by his own hands, a chisel hammered out of an old file which he found on the farm and only newspaper cuts of Dewey for his models, he has shaped from a common turnpike rock a miniature bust of the hero of Manila. The work is so perfect that it has attracted the admiration of many lovers of art, who jointly are devising a plan for the development of the boy's talents.

A Strange Case. GEORGETOWN, Ky., March 11.—Sister Mary Stanislaus died at Cardome Friday. She was one of the best known and oldest sisters, having been at the convent ever since it was started years ago at White Sulphur. Her former home was at Maysville. She had not tasted meat for 30 years until a few months ago, when she ate a piece of sausage. It threw her into convulsions, and she never recovered from the effect.

Charter Amended. FRANKFORT, Ky., March 11.—The Cumberland Telephone and Telegraph Co., a western Kentucky corporation, with headquarters at Hopkinsville, filed amended article of incorporation Friday with the secretary of state, increasing its capital from \$3,000,000 to \$5,000,000. The fee paid for the state for this increase was \$3,000, or \$1.00 on each \$1,000.

Fired Five Times. RICHMOND, Ky., March 11.—Herman Dudley, late of the 4th Kentucky, created a scene here on Irvine street Friday by attacking Wright Hamilton, an employe of Hamilton's broom factory, shooting at him five times at close range, but without effect. Dudley escaped and is now being pursued by officers.

Mrs. Hitchens Ready for Trial.

LEXINGTON, Ky., March 11.—Mrs. Lisbeth Hitchens, of Glens Falls, N. Y., arrived here Friday night, accompanied by her husband, her sister and brother-in-law. Mrs. Hitchens comes to answer the charge of robbing Poolisler Herdie of \$1,500 here last fall. She is under \$1,500 bond, and her trial is set for next Tuesday.

John Henry Franklin Hanged. GLASGOW, Ky., March 11.—John Henry Franklin, a white man, aged 40 years, was hung in the jail yard here Friday morning at 7:15 o'clock for the assassination of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Mary Coleman Bowles, on the night of September 10 last. His neck was broken in the fall and he died in 11 minutes.

Another Victim at Lexington. LEXINGTON, Ky., March 11.—Another death resulted Friday after six hours' illness from cerebro spinal meningitis. Physicians report a number of persons ill from fear of contracting the dread disease. It has broken out among the Negroes. The board of health has ordered the isolation of all cases.

Ordinances Held Valid. FRANKFORT, Ky., March 11.—The court of appeals Friday decided that ordinances passed by fourth-class cities to prevent live stock from running at large, and providing for selling said stock when taken up and impounded, are valid.

Sorely Afflicted Family. WILLIAMSTOWN, Ky., March 11.—The eight-year-old child of Louis Martin is dead from a disease resembling Asiatic leprosy. Two more of the children have died from the same disease within the past three weeks. Another child of the same family is afflicted.

Too Heavy to Ride. LEXINGTON, Ky., March 11.—Jockey Soup Perkins will not be seen in the saddle this year. He has grown too heavy to ride. He has not made up his mind as to his future, but will probably assist his brothers in the training of a string of horses.

Aged Woman Killed. WINCHESTER, Ky., March 11.—Mrs. Mary Kearns, aged 85 years, was run over and killed in the railroad yard near here. The body will be sent to Paris for burial.

An Aged Citizen Dead. NICHOLASVILLE, Ky., March 11.—Nicholas Arnold, aged 89, one of Jessamine county's oldest citizens, died of paralysis at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mary Blakeman.

Hutcherson Held. WILLIAMSTOWN, Ky., March 11.—Harry Hutcherson, aged 18, charged with wrecking a Southern train at Corinth, has been held in the sum of \$2,000 for trial in June.

His Head Struck a Tree. STANFORD, Ky., March 11.—Walter Gooch, living near here, met death through his horse running away with him and crushing his head by running under a tree and striking a limb.
