NEWS IN KENTUCKY.

A Cent in An Egg. LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 29.—Patrolman Joseph Spahn, of the Louisville police force, had hard boiled eggs in his lunch Friday night. In the yolk of one of the eggs he found a bright one-cent piece dated 1897. Proof of the copper being found in the egg when it was broken open is abundant. The penny is supposed to have been swallowed by the hen that laid the egg.

Stabbed by a Fugitive. LANCASTER, Ky., April 29.—Geo. Jenkins, a Negro, escaped from the workhouse. He broke into the house of Alvin Estes, a farmer. Estes, Cornett, a brother-in-law, and another man pursued Jenkins, when he turned on Cornett with a knife and cut him in the right side. Jenkins was overpowered and tied and brought here and lodged in jail Friday night.

A Bottle Famine. LEXINGTON, Ky., April 29.—Manager Zitt, of the Lexington brewery, says the exportation of bottled beer to Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippines has caused a bottle famine; that it is difficult to get bottles, and all factories are working overtime trying to fill orders. It is impossible to keep brewers supplied.

First and Last Sermon. PLEASURVILLE, Ky., April 29.—A Methodist church that had been in use for 62 years, was torn down here Friday to make way for a new edifice. Rev. James J. Johnson delivered the last sermon Thursday night. A strange fact was that he preached the first sermon when he was a boy of 16. He is now 78.

Will Visit Her Home. LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 29.—Mr. and Mrs. Antonio de Navarro, the latter formerly Mary Anderson, the actress, who have arrived in New York, will come to this city. Word has been received by her friends here to that effect. She was born and made her debut here.

Stabbed a Minister. ALBANY, Ky., April 29.—James Neal, while drunk, went to a church 14 miles north of here and became very offensive. W. H. Woodson, the preacher, tried to put him out and was seriously stabbed by Neal. Neal escaped, but was captured.

A Prisoner Once More. FRANKFORT, Ky., April 29.—Ex-Cashier William Shipp, of Midway, was re-arrested at the penitentiary doors upon being released at the expiration of his term, served for making false entries. He will be tried upon other indictments for similar offenses.

Mysterious Death at Paris. PARIS, Ky., April 29.—Will Stivers died here under mysterious circumstances. He was ill but three days and the physicians are unable to account for his trouble. There are strong suspicions that he was sandbagged. A post mortem will be held.

Manuel in Good Condition. LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 29.—Manuel, the favorite in the Kentucky Derby, arrived in the city from Memphis Friday afternoon. He is in excellent condition, and will run the race of his life, Tarai will ride Manuel.

Scaled to Death. OWENSBORO, Ky., April 29.—The little child of John Heflin, while rolling a hoop in the yard at her father's home, near Pellville, ran into a cauldron of boiling lye and was so badly burned that she died in a few hours.

Printer Commits Suicide. LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 29.—At Seebree, Ky., the body of Emerson Roper, a printer, was found in his room with an empty pistol by his side. No cause for the suicide known. Three balls entered his body, one piercing the heart.

Will Be Buried in Cave Hill. LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 29.—The remains of Harry P. Johnson and George C. Butler, 1st Kentucky soldiers, arrived from Porto Rico Friday to be buried in Cave Hill.

Dr. E. E. McDonough Dead. LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 29.—Dr. E. E. McDonough, state examiner of the Catholic Knights and Ladies of Honor, died at his home in this city Friday night. He was 56 years of age.

Farmer Hangs Himself. AUGUSTA, Ky., April 29.—John C. Moneyhon, aged 59, a well to do farmer, Friday hanged himself in an old abandoned tenement house. He had been dependent owing to ill health.

Louisville After the Encampment. LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 29.—A movement is on foot to secure the United Confederate Veterans' encampment for Louisville in 1900.

Engineer Corps to Be Mustered Out. SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—The engineer corps, which arrived from Honolulu on the steamer Australia, was Friday conveyed to the Presidio. They will be mustered out shortly.

Todd Sloane Wins Again. LONDON, April 29.—At Newmarket Friday Todd Sloane won the 1,000-guinea stakes on Pierre Lorillard's Sibola, a horse bred in America. The betting was 13 to 8 against Sibola.

PARIS, April 29.—Col. Paty De Clam, whose court-martial is about to be ordered by Gen. De Freycinet, minister of war, is reported to have left Paris.



INTERESTING NEWS ITEMS.

The town of Cheek, near Ardmore, I. T., was entirely destroyed by fire Thursday night. The loss is heavy.

Friday's statement of the condition of the treasury shows: Available cash balance, \$286,375,355; gold reserve, \$244,736,845.

Secretary Alger left Washington Friday night for a visit of a week to Detroit and Chicago where he will make several addresses.

Grave fears are entertained for the safety of the American steamer Kanawha, Capt. Evans, which sailed from Newport News, Va., on March 29, for Bermuda.

Maj. Gen. W. R. Shafter, who went east to testify in the army beef inquiry, has returned to San Francisco and resumed his duties as commander of the department of California.

At Glenwood, Ia., the hospital building of the state asylum for the feeble minded was destroyed by fire at midnight Thursday night. A panic was averted only by the coolness of the attendants. Loss \$25,000.

A howling blizzard has been raging all throughout the Black hills for the past 12 hours. Six inches of snow have fallen there and reports from farther north state the fall is heavier. All farm work is suspended.

The gunboat Nashville left Greenville, Miss., at noon Friday for Helena, Ark. The officers kept open house from 8 a. m. until noon. Thousands of people went aboard and took a look at the armament of the ship.

Perry Belmont and Mrs. Jessie A. Sloane, the divorced wife of Henry T. Sloane, were married at 8:30 o'clock Friday night at Greenwich, Ct., by Rev. Walter M. Barrows, pastor of the Second Congregational church of that city.

The business portion of St. Francis, county seat of Cheyenne county, Kan., was destroyed by a fire which broke out shortly after 1 o'clock Saturday morning. Fifteen buildings were destroyed, leaving only one business house standing.

August Strausburg, commission dealer in hops and malt, New York, has filed a petition in bankruptcy. Liabilities \$78,240; no assets. Alonzo Nutter, well known hotel keeper, has filed a petition in bankruptcy. Liabilities \$52,712; no assets.

Everything is quiet at Wardner, Ida. Sixty men from town have gone to work in the Bunker Hill and Sullivan mines unmolested. One hundred and fifty more have gone to work in the Last Chance mine, the scale of wages being \$3.00 and \$3.50 per day.

All the London morning papers contained editorials congratulating the United States upon the prospect of peace in the Philippines and compli-

menting the bravery and endurance of the American troops which have produced the much-desired result.

J. E. Wisconsin, city treasurer of Argentine, Kan., a suburb of Kansas City, has absconded. He is \$16,900 short in his accounts. The city council and Mayor Green Friday night authorized the issuing of a warrant for his arrest charging embezzlement.

John P. Ross, of Sharon, Mass., was shot and killed by his wife, Mary E. Ross, in the course of a quarrel at their home Friday. She says she acted in self-defense, as her husband was choking her at the time. The pair had been married about a year and were middle-aged.

Among the arrivals at San Francisco from the Orient on the America Maru Friday was Gen. Thomas Anderson, who had been ordered to report to the adjutant for assignment to duty. He left here for Manila as a colonel in the regular army and returns a major general of volunteers.

The Panama Trouble About Over.

PANA, Ill., April 29.—It is announced that a meeting Saturday, composed of J. M. Hunter, state president of the United Mineworkers; W. D. Ryan, the secretary, and E. E. Russell, state secretary, and Messrs. D. E. Cahill and Keefe, of the board of arbitration, and the Pana operators, will take place in Pana. It is considered certain that this meeting will put an end to the strike.

The Fatalities in the Philippines.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—A statement prepared by the war department shows that 198 were killed in the Philippines from February 4 to April 28, and 1,111 wounded; total, 1,309.
