WOOD IS NOMINATED.

Result of the Republican Convention at Richmond.

ADMINISTRATIONS INDORSEI.

The Republican Convention called Tuesday at Richmond to nominate a candidate for Railroad Commissioner in the Third District adjourned late yesterday afternoon after declaring Hon. John C. Wood of Mt. Sterling as the man for the place.

It took eight ballots to decide the matter. The permanent officers of the Convention were W. J. Hiseem of Newport Chairman, and Messrs. T. J. Young of Owingsville and J. T. Wilson of Cynthiana Secretaries.

On the call for nominations the names of eleven men were put before the Convention, but from the first it looked as though the Wood delegation had the best of affairs.

After Mr. Wood's nomination some of the defeated candidates addressed the meeting, pledging their support to the nominee.

The Convention also adopted resolutions indorsing the administrations of President McKinley and Governor Bradley, and condemning Civil Service.

MASON FISCAL COURT.

Yesterday's Turnpike Session a Great Big Fizzle.

IT WILL MEET AGAIN TUESDAY.

The Mason Fiscal Court met yesterday morning to devise ways and means to get hold of the pikes now controlled by the county by lease, which expires tomorrow.

The Court was addressed at length by Messrs. C. D. Pearce and W. W. Baldwin, and on next Monday the Court will confer with these gentlemen, when they expect to come to some terms.

Colonel Baldwin agrees to keep the gates of the roads owned by him until the 9th of this month, the county to pay the various pikes the amounts due for the time over the lease at the rate now in force.

County Attorney O'Donnell presented a written report relative to the refusal of the M. and B. S. Railroad to pay its proportion of the tax levied by the Fiscal Court with which to pay interest on and to discharge said railroad debt. The Company has refused to pay its part of the levy for some time, but no one knew the grounds upon which they based their refusal. Mr. O'Donnell made diligent search and found three decisions by the Court of Appeals where a company or corporation was exempt from paying the levy upon a debt owed to said company or corporation, and upon these decisions the Railroad Company has refused to pay the 3 1/2 cents levied by the Fiscal Court to pay off the \$50,000 in bonds issued by the county in order to secure the building of the M. and B. S. Railroad through this county.



NEWBY NOTES FROM NATURE'S GREAT HIGHWAY.



The sawmill boat Champion passed up light. The wickets at Davis Island Dam will be raised by tomorrow.

The Keystone State will pass up tonight for Pittsburgh with a nice start.

The Henry M. Stanley will go to Kanawha tonight, returning Sunday morning.

About 4,000,000 bushels of coal are loaded at Pittsburgh waiting for more water.

The Virginia will pass down tomorrow night from Pittsburgh. She is almost scraping bottom.

The Josh Cook, which has just completed a trip to New Orleans, passed up with a tow of empties for Pittsburgh.

There is quite a nice little rise coming out of both rivers at headwaters, which will be very pleasant news to steamboatmen.

The boat, from New Orleans for Pittsburgh with a big tow of empties, broke a cross-head, piston-rod, follower cylinder and side pipe at Cairo, and is coming up on one engine to be repaired. It was quite a serious accident.

Major Bixby is advertising for the hire of a towboat of about 14-inch cylinders with 5-foot stroke to serve as tender for the Ohio river dredges during the present season. Bids will be received at his office in the Custom House at Cincinnati until May 31st.

Captain A. J. Mossett, the Cincinnati agent of the steamer Avalon and City of Pittsburgh, received a letter Tuesday from Captain Phillips of the Pittsburgh saying that the repairs to his boat will be completed in time for the City of Pittsburgh to leave Louisville on Friday, but that changes were against her going on account of low water.

Gray's Iron Line has commenced to load 20,000 tons of steel rails for shipment to New Orleans. The rails are being shipped by the Carnegie Steel Company (limited). Captain W. B. Rodgers said Tuesday morning that the repairs now being made to the towboat Iron Age would be completed in about two weeks, when she will leave with a tow of rails for New Orleans. It will take several towboats to transport the rails, for there will be about 25 barge loads.

The steamer Avalon, which makes weekly trips between Cincinnati and all points on the Kanawha river, that broke her shaft above Portsmouth, is at Cincinnati, where a shaft will be fitted up for her. Captain L. Cramer, the principal owner of the Avalon, has arranged to have his boat's repairs made without delay. It was reported that Captain Cramer found an old shaft there that can be fitted up to suit the Avalon, and it will not even be necessary to wait for a new one to be made. She will be back in her trade next week. The Avalon is a new boat, being less than a year old, but the breaking of a shaft is something that cannot be guarded against.
