TERRIBLE ACCIDENT. Captain "Diek" Smith Had Both Legs Cut Off at Covington.

Captain R. L. Smith, who for quite a number of years was the polite and popular Conductor on the C. and O. Maysville Accommodation, a former resident of this city and well liked by everybody, met with a terrible accident this morning about 8 o'clock in the Covington yards.

He was the Conductor on train No. 1 this morning, which, after discharging its passengers at Cincinnati, is backed over to the Covington yards.

As the train was passing Fifteenth street he stepped off.

An L. and N. freight train was throwing a cut of cars on the track alongside the C. and O., which struck him and knocked him under No. 1.

Both legs were cut off and he was otherwise bruised to such an extent that it is thought he cannot recover.

Captain Smith is a member of Maysville Commandery No. 10, K. T., and his many friends will regret to learn of his unfortunate accident.

MORE TURNPIKE NEWS. Members of M. and L. Company at Lexington Fight Injunction Suit.

Judge Bullock and Fayette county stockholders of the Maysville and Lexington Turnpike Company held a meeting at Lexington to discuss the injunction brought against them several weeks ago by Colonel W. W. Baldwin, President of the road.

It was decided to fight the injunction proceedings and the firm of Bronston & Allen and Mr. W. W. Worthington of that place employed as counsel.

A long legal battle is expected. Colonel Baldwin, it is said, is about to institute mandamus proceedings against the state to compel it to withdraw the turnpike stock and collateral held by it on his notes in payment for stock aggregating about \$10,000.

Colonel Baldwin requested the Sinking Fund Commissioners to withdraw the stock and collateral and they refused, and mandamus proceedings are threatened.
