THE LEXINGTON TROTS.

In Stakes and Purses \$80,000 Will Be Given Away—The Chief Event Will Be the Transylvania Stakes.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 2.—\$80,000 in stakes and purses will be given away at the ten-day meeting of the Lexington trots which commences Tuesday. The chief event will be the \$10,000 Transylvania. Peter the Great, Lord Vincent and other good ones will start.

The richest stake of the meeting will be the \$10,000 Kentucky futurity. Twelve carloads of the greatest campaigners in the country arrived Sunday, over 200 in number, worth in the aggregate nearly \$1,000,000, and probably as rich a train of horse flesh as was ever made up, and prominent people from the east and north have arrived.

Young Woman Burned to Death.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 2.—Mrs. Nanette Morrison, 23 years of age, was burned to death at her home near this city on the Preston street road Sunday. She was standing at a grate, when her apron strings caught fire and she was soon enveloped in flames. Her husband, in tearing off her clothing, was severely burned about the hands and face. Mrs. Morrison lived about three hours after the accident.

Will Have to Pay Again.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 2.—The suit of the commonwealth of Kentucky for Fayette county against D. A. Sayre & Co., to recover taxes for the capital stock of \$30,000 for the year 1899, was tried in the county court and decided in favor of the plaintiff. The bank claimed that the taxes had been paid, but could not produce the receipt.

A Pardon Refused.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Oct. 2.—In refusing to restore Nathan Osborne, of Harlan county, to citizenship Gov. Bradley said: "It is said that the applicant was convicted of false swearing, but is now a fairly good citizen. I am also assured that he is a republican, and if I pardon him it will be another vote for the republican party. Refused."

Steward's Residence Burned.

HOPKINSVILLE, Ky., Oct. 2.—The steward's residence at the Western Lunatic asylum was destroyed by fire Sunday. Most of its contents, the property of Judge Anderson, the steward, were saved. The origin of the fire is not known. The loss will be several thousand dollars, covered by insurance.

Appointed a Marshal.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 2.—J. Howard Wilson has been appointed deputy United States marshal to succeed J. M. Blair, who killed Laban T. Lewis and was himself shot to death by Lewis. Wilson is a prominent republican of Mt. Sterling.
