methods; but he never demands less than  
50 per cent. and frequently 65 per cent.  
Not satisfied with that, he has attempted,  
on more than one occasion, to defraud  
his clients. The latest instance of this  
sort occurred on Thursday last in Cov-  
ington, when, just before the Circuit Clerk's  
office closed, Messrs. WILBY & WALD,  
Cincinnati attorneys, filed suit against  
GOEBEL for \$500 on behalf of THOMAS  
and MARY CARLETON, who allege that  
GOEBEL holds that amount without  
authority. The CARLETONS allege that  
they employed GOEBEL to sue the South  
Covington and Cincinnati Street Railway  
for injuries received by MARY CARLETON,  
and that he was to get 50 per cent. of  
the amount recovered. The Company, July  
11th, 1898, compromised the suit and paid  
GOEBEL \$3,500. They allege that he  
gave them only \$1,250 instead of \$1,750.  
Surely every Kentuckian ought to feel  
proud to have such a man as this for his  
Governor!

KENTUCKY FLASHES.  
TROOPS ARE READY.

Clay County Circuit Court Opened Monday  
and State Troops Are Prepared  
to Move at Once.

LONDON, Ky., Oct. 25.—Clay county  
circuit court opened Monday at Man-  
chester. The feudists, Eddy and Floyd  
Chadwell and Sol, Tom and Jim Griffin  
will be tried for the killing of Deputy  
Wash Thacker, of the Philpot faction.  
Gov. Bradley has troops in readiness to  
go to the protection of the court im-  
mediately upon request of the judge.  
Since the last term of court 20 men  
and one woman have been shot, and  
there are only four indictments.

Farm Hand Charged With Murder.  
MUNFORDSVILLE, Ky., Oct. 23.—De-  
puty Sheriff John E. Hubbard arrested  
and lodged in jail here George Davis,  
who lived on the farm of Mrs. Shipp,  
who, with her grandson, was murdered  
Monday night. Blood was found on  
his clothing. He claims that he got it  
there while possum hunting. Two  
other men who are suspected are being  
pursued.

Fearing a Lynching.  
COLUMBIA, Ky., Oct. 23.—Mac Jen-  
nings, aged 24, is charged with shoot-  
ing and fatally wounding Arch Merely,  
at Burksville. The wounded man is a  
brother of the jailer of Cumberland.  
The prisoner was brought here be-  
cause he objected to being placed with  
him, and partly because of fear of a  
mob in case Merely died.

Brothers' Fatal Quarrel.  
WINCHESTER, Ky., Oct. 23.—At Ford  
Jerry Taylor and Joe Taylor, brothers,  
and colored, fought, and Joe was dis-  
emboweled by Jerry with a pocket  
knife. The wound is fatal. Jerry fled  
and has not been apprehended. A dis-  
pute over the proper way to raise  
children caused the trouble.

The Elks' Carnival and Street Fair.  
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 23.—The elks'  
carnival and street fair ended Satur-  
day night. The last day was Ken-  
tucky day. Gov. Bradley and his staff  
were given a public reception. The  
attendance on the last day was 50,000.  
The profits are well over \$30,000.

Revenue Agent Transferred.  
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 23.—David  
Gates, internal revenue agent for the  
Kentucky district, has been transferred  
to the Atlanta district, where he will  
have charge of Alabama, Georgia and  
Florida. He is succeeded by Agent W.  
W. Yates, of Pennsylvania.

Newton Elliston Dead.  
VERMILION, Ky., Oct. 23.—Newton  
Elliston, who was thrown and trampled  
by a young horse he was riding  
last Wednesday, is dead. He was an  
ex-confederate soldier and a member  
of the democratic county committee.

Death of Ephraim D. Sayre.  
LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 23.—Ephraim  
D. Sayre, president of the Kentucky  
Bankers' association and one of Ken-  
tucky's leading financiers, died here  
Sunday of acute stomach trouble, aged  
78.

Held to the Circuit Court.  
RICHMOND, Ky., Oct. 23.—Luther  
Creekmore, son of Rev. N. B. Creeke-  
more, charged in five cases with ob-  
taining money by forged checks, was  
held over to the circuit court in default  
of \$400 bond.

Both Kicked to Death.  
BARDWELL, Ky., Oct. 23.—White  
"frollicking" with a mule on the Brown  
place, three miles south of here, Sun-  
day afternoon, brothers Tom and  
"Bud" Williams were simultaneously  
kicked and almost instantly killed.

Obscene Literature Through the Mails.  
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 23.—Harry D.  
Williams has been arrested, charged  
with sending obscene literature  
through the mails. The literature in  
question consisted of medical adver-  
tisements.

Clothing Stolen.  
LANCASTER, Ky., Oct. 23.—Powell's  
store was entered and a quantity of  
clothing stolen. Detective Hampton  
arrested Anderson Sutton, who con-  
fessed and restored the stolen goods.

Blew Into the Gun.  
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 23.—Luther  
Johnson blew into a gun to see if it  
was loaded. Johnson's head was blown  
off.

Killed by a Train.  
OWENSBORO, Ky., Oct. 23.—Graham  
Bear was killed near Falcon by a  
train.

Small pox at Stony Creek.  
CARLSLE, Ky., Oct. 23.—At Stony  
creek five well developed cases of  
smallpox exist.

Child Fatally Burned.  
LEITCHFIELD, Ky., Oct. 23.—The 3-  
year-old child of Abe Cull fell into the  
fireplace and was burned fatally.

Typhoid Fever in a Camp.  
SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 23.—Advises  
from Cape Nome, Alaska, brought by  
the steamer Lakme, which left there  
October 6, are that typhoid fever has  
broken out in the camp in severe form.  
The hospital is crowded, their now  
being 250 patients in it.

WAKEFIELD, Mass., Oct. 23.—Fire  
Monday morning destroyed George H.  
Hathaway's large stable with its valu-  
able contents; an engine house, the  
Perkins block, Porter's laundry and  
seven dwelling houses. The loss will  
exceed \$50,000.


