During the Thanksgiving and holiday season Kentucky shipped to Eastern markets 2,141,190 pounds of turkeys, valued at \$255,423.46, an average of \$11.92 per 100 pounds.

The Avalon will pass down from Pomeroy tonight.

The Henry M. Stanley will be up tonight for Pomeroy.

The barge lost by the Pacific was loaded with 800 tons of aluminum ore.

The Ironsides ran through herself at Portsmouth, and is there being repaired.

The towboat Joe B. Williams has a steel shaft in her wheel that has been in use seventeen years.

There is a steady decline in the river and owing to the cold snap it is more than likely that another week will not see the Pittsburgh packets running.

The rule said to have been adopted by the Coal Combine is not being strictly enforced, as the Tornado, a 17-inch cylinder boat, passed down with a tow.

No coal was shipped from Pittsburgh Saturday, there being no boats in port to take it out. The coal was all shipped South on the last water, and as there is not enough to ship coal on at the present the nearby towns will have to do without until another rise comes along.

The Monongahela River Consolidated Coal and Coke Company has shipped South since December 13th 876 barges and 512 coalboats, containing 24,552,000 bushels of coal. Navigation was resumed on December 13th. The same concern has also shipped South 10,000 tons of steel rails, besides several thousand tons of wire and nails, and much of the latter product is being loaded.


