ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE.

Mr. Jesse B. Roper Takes Rough on Rats to End His Life.

The friends of Mr. Jesse B. Roper—and they are legion—were inexpressibly shocked yesterday to learn that he had attempted to end his life by a dose of Rough on Rats.

He had returned from Cincinnati Tuesday evening and went to his home on East Second street at a late hour.

Previously he had procured the poison and prepared it for taking.

About 7 o'clock yesterday morning his wife arose and went about the household duties, leaving Mr. Roper in bed, he usually sleeping until about 8 o'clock.

Between 8 and 9 o'clock she heard him vomiting and hastened to his side, to find that he had taken the poison.

Medical aid was summoned immediately and in a few hours he had been so far relieved as to give hope for recovery.

Mr. Roper came here from Cynthia several years ago and opened a cafe and saloon, at once securing a good trade.

He is a man of exceptional habits, never having tasted liquor in any form; and he is personally popular with all who know him.

His friends are at a loss to determine the cause of his action, unless it be attributed to despondency on account of some business affair.

While Mr. Roper did not rest well last night, it is thought the danger point has been passed and that he will soon be fully restored.

The Gate City was at this port yesterday.

The Avalon is due down tonight from Pomeroy.

The Keystone State is the Pittsburgh packet tonight.

The Henry M. Stanley will go to Charleston tonight.

Sandy river is putting out immense rafts of railroad ties.

The through boats from Cincinnati to New Orleans have quit for the summer.

What the City of Chicago needs is Ohio river towboats to handle barges.

Captain Frank Norwood has resigned from the New South to go out on the Joe Fowler.

Leslie Woodworth is now one of the clerks of the Edgington independent line steamer Pearce. He was formerly on the Courier, but when that line reduced the wages of its officers and crews last week, Mr. Woodworth was one who would not stand the cut, and quit.

An old steamboat clerk remarks: "The average shipper does not know how severe a penalty he subjects himself to when he bills freight at less than its true weight. I do not remember how low a penalty may be imposed by the Court, but the highest penalty is \$500 for each offense."

The supplemental River and Harbor Bill, which carries an appropriation of about \$10,000,000, meets with opposition from the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and there are doubts as to its passage. Among the improvements provided for is the measure of Congressman Pugh for an ice harbor in front of this city.

The marks at Davis Island Dam Tuesday night showed the Ohio river to be at the 5-foot mark, which is not sufficient water to boat coal. The prediction of the Weather Bureau is that the streams thereabouts will remain stationary during the ensuing twenty-four hours and then fall. The coal situation in the South, from advices received, is becoming serious. It is said that there is not a two weeks' supply at Cincinnati, while nearby points are being supplied by rail. If there is not a rise before June 1 it is estimated that there will be at least 30,000,000 bushels of loaded coal in the Pittsburgh harbor. This will require two trips to the South.

Bids for the construction of Lock No. 1 on the Big Sandy river will be opened at the Custom House, Cincinnati, June 9. This lock will be located at Catlettsburg, just inside the mouth of the Big Sandy river. It is understood that Lock No. 2 will be built soon. There is already built, and in most successful operation, a lock and dam at Louisa. Locks Nos. 1 and 2 will give a pool stage of water to the Louisa dam, and that pool already reaches up the river sufficiently to make the river one of the most productive tributaries of the Ohio river. The new dams in the Big Sandy will be what are known as needle dams, and will be even higher than the dam at Louisa, which is the highest movable dam in the world.
