NO TRUTH IN IT.

Article on Mr. James Dunn Copied From a Fleming Paper.

In yesterday's LEDGER appeared an item taken from the Flemingsburg Times-Democrat stating that the rumor prevailed there that Mr. James Dunn had died in this county and that before death he had confessed to the murder of his brother in 1879.

THE LEDGER deeply regrets that it was led astray by its Flemingsburg contemporary, for it has since learned that there is not a word of truth in the report.

Mr. Dunn is at present a tenant on the Slack farm near Washington, where he has been a resident for the past seven or eight years, and is recognized as one of the best citizens of the county.

About a year since he was stricken with paralysis, and some weeks ago suffered a second stroke, and although confined to his house, his mental faculties are unimpaired and his physicians have hopes of his ultimate recovery.

WORDS OF WARNING!

What Green R. Keller, Democratic Editor, Says About Fraud.

The Hon. Green R. Keller, Editor of the Carlisle Mercury, and a leading Democratic politician of the state, in a letter from Frankfort to his paper under date of October 25th, 1900, gives this advice to those who attempt fraud at the coming election:

"There are a few words I want to say to my friends, if I have any. Keep your hands clean at the coming election, if you wish to enjoy the society of your family for the next four or five years. I cannot enter into a long explanation of what I mean, but if you fail to take my advice you will, in all probability, find out the full meaning to your sorrow. Now, don't understand that I am going to interest myself in getting you into trouble, but I know there is going to be trouble if any wrong is done."
