THE paramount issue now is, "Who struck BILLY BRYAN?"

WELL, the Kentucky Republicans got Ed. O'REAR anyway; and that's a whole lot.

HAVING heard the news from America, AGUINALDO may now resume running where he left off.

ACCORDING to Br'er Judge WATT'S Ewing Inquirer Mr. BRYAN is still running for the Presidency.

THERE are about 60,000,000 persons in the United States who had no voice in Tuesday's election, estimating the number who did vote at 15,000,000. Think of it, 60,000,000 governed without their consent!

THE Republicans of Kentucky are not cast down. They have elected Judge Ed. C. O'REAR to the Court of Appeals; and really that's better than having the Governor. However, they ought to have both—and would have with an honest count of the votes.

BRYAN says his defeat was a great surprise to him. No doubt of it. He was so busy during the campaign talking through his hat that he didn't pay any attention to THE LEDGER'S warnings. If he had, he would have saved himself the slightest "surprise."

THE election Tuesday settled one point forever. The Aguinaldo insurrection in the Philippines will hereafter have no encouragement from the expectation of BRYAN'S election. The criticisms of the American soldier and the unmeasured denunciation of the Administration's Philippine policy, which the Democratic orators have lately indulged in, will not give aid and comfort to the Filipinos. It will now not be hard for them to realize that no assistance from the United States or from Europe or Asia is to be expected. It will appear to them that the fight against the American flag is useless and the waste of blood calculated to bring great woe to the Filipinos.

THE Hon. T. C. CATCHINGS of Mississippi gives this sound advice to the National Democracy—

"Drop Free-silver; drop fusionism; drop the cry of government by injunction; drop the cry of imperialism and militarism; drop all the discussion about the Philippines until peace has been restored; drop appeals to the passions and prejudices of the idle and discontented. Revive the fundamental question of taxation; teach the Democratic doctrine that people cannot be made rich by taxing them; assail the favoritisms and wrongs of a high Protective Tariff; stand for the control of Trusts and combines by methods not oppressive; demand enlargement of the powers of the Inter-state Commerce Commission and the liberal improvement of harbors and insist on local self-government, and let the next Presidential candidate remain at home during the campaign."

A Day's Doings in Kentucky.

ENGLISH METHOD.

The Big Horse Breeders Will Adopt a New Scheme in Disposing of Brood Mares.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 12.—Messrs. Keene, Huggin, Whitney and Belmont, that quartette of eastern millionaires who maintain magnificent breeding establishments in the blue grass and keep them stocked with the best strains of English thoroughbred blood, are going to be a bit more "English" this fall. In England it is the custom among wealthy breeders each year to sell off some matrons of the thoroughbred harem which have ceased to attract the owners' fancy or which, for the reason that he has become a bit "long" on some particular strain, he must be rid of to give place to others of a different and usually more strenuous strain. In other words, it is a system of "swapping" mares under the hammer. In this country it has been the custom for breeders to keep the mares they have bred or bought until they die, or, becoming unfit for further use in the stud, are given away to some aged darky farmer for use as a "road horse."

From the establishment of Messrs. Keene, Huggin, Whitney and Belmont about 200 head of highly bred brood mares will be sold at auction in this city during the second week in December. This does not mean that these gentlemen are "shortening" their studs. Their representatives say they will replace the mares disposed of with others.

Both Arms Mangled.
 Hopkinsville, Ky., Nov. 12.—Howard Frame, a wealthy young South Christian planter, was feeding a corn sheller when both hands became entangled in the machinery, and his arms were drawn in and frightfully crushed. His left arm had to be amputated at once to save his life. The right arm was broken in several places and the fingers of his hand torn off.

Drowned in the River.
 Henderson, Ky., Nov. 12.—George Fruit, aged 23, was found dead in 15 inches of water in the river here on Sunday morning. When last seen alive, it is alleged, Fruit was intoxicated, and it is believed he attempted to get into a skiff, fell into the river and was unable to keep his head above the water. Fruit leaves a widow and one child.

To Raise Belgian Hares.
 Lexington, Ky., Nov. 12.—The Kentucky Belgian Hare association has been formed for the purpose of promoting the raising of Belgian hares in Central Kentucky. Will Fight Dave Sullivan.
 Louisville, Ky., Nov. 12.—Tim Callahan wired New York Sunday night that he would meet Dave Sullivan in a 25-round bout at the Auditorium, in this city, on November 19, under the auspices of the Southern Athletic club. He declined to train to 124 pounds, and the match is at catch weights.

Father Loses His Child.
 Owensboro, Ky., Nov. 12.—In the habeas corpus proceedings of T. L. Gant, of Hopkinsville, against Mabel Davison, his former wife, for possession of their 5-year-old son, Special Judge Morrison dismissed the writ, thus continuing the custody of the child with the mother.

Ferguson's Remains.
 Lexington, Ky., Nov. 12.—The body of James B. Ferguson, the noted starter, who died at the Good Samaritan hospital Saturday night, was taken to Louisville Monday morning. The funeral services were held in the chapel at Cave Hill cemetery, where the body was interred at noon.

A Bloody Record.
 Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 12.—"One Arm" Kelly, a white man, shot and perhaps fatally wounded Richard Clark, colored. There have been 21 homicides in this county since last January, and if Clark dies, as expected, this will make 22.

None Thrown Out.
 Louisville, Ky., Nov. 12.—The official count in Lawrence county gives McKinley and Yerkes 99 majority and Pugh 76. No precincts nor votes were thrown out, as has been persistently reported.

Flourished a Gun.
 Ashland, Ky., Nov. 12.—Officers Smith and Scott, of Ironton, attempted to arrest George Bear in this city, but Bear covered them with a gun and effected his escape. He is wanted on a burglary charge.

Preacher Sues Doctor.
 Greenup, Ky., Nov. 12.—Circuit court, now in session, will have the \$10,000 damage suit of Rev. James Bailey, of Springville, against Dr. Wm. M. Lottridge, for malpractice in attending a broken leg.

Fire in a Restaurant.
 Lexington, Ky., Nov. 12.—The Delicatessen restaurant, on Main street, opposite the Phoenix hotel, was gutted by fire at 3:15 o'clock Sunday morning. Loss, \$5,000.

Inflicted a Fatal Wound.
 Pineville, Ky., Nov. 12.—In a remote district of Bell county a man named Miracle shot a Mr. Wilder, inflicting a wound from which he will probably die.
