At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Maysville Gas Company March 28th, 1903, it was ordered, that on and after the 1st day of April, 1903, the above stated scale of gas for all purposes, fuel and illuminating, should go into effect for private consumption. All rates and discounts heretofore made are abolished. It was also ordered that after the 1st of April the old rate of the Company, "Gas will be turned off, if account is not paid within five days after presentation," shall be strictly and indiscriminately enforced, regardless of whom it may concern. (This action was taken, not to appear arbitrary, nor with the intent that the accounts of old consumers were not perfectly good any time during the month, or a year later for that matter, but for the good of all concerned and in order that this part of the business of the Company might be taken up at a specified time during the month and disposed of, and further in order that the time and thought of the Company's agents and employees, now so largely occupied with this work of collecting, might, for the balance of the month, be directed towards giving consumers the best attention and more efficient supply and service.) It was further ordered that, beginning the 1st of May, and for each and every month thereafter, the monthly statement of account of each consumer should be delivered to said consumer by an agent of the Company on the first day of the month, or second day if the first comes on Sunday, and that said account shall thereafter be due and payable at the office of the Company on Court-street within five days, and if not so paid gas will be promptly shut off. The Gas Company further announces that after the 1st day of April they will handle and sell at cost price to gas consumers any of the great variety of Gas Stoves and Ranges shown in the catalogue of the Detroit Stove Works, which prices will be equivalent to the discount from the list prices in said catalogue. Said stoves will be sold for cash only, or according to the terms of a printed lease, whereby easy payments are extended over a period of from twelve to seventeen months. For instance: Take a gas range with its range at \$26; the Gas Company will sell this range to consumer for \$11 cash, or for \$2.80 each at signing of lease and 60¢ per month, for seventeen months, at the expiration of which time the range is sole property of consumer.
